'Honor your father and mother' (this is the first commandment with a promise), 'that it may go well with you and that you may live long in the land.' Fathers, do not provoke your children to anger, but bring them up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord."

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BACKGROUND:

In chapter six of Ephesians Paul shifts his focus to the relationship between the children and their parents. He recognizes the importance of the Christian family and its impact on society. We may not all be parents, but we are all children. Many of us are honored to be called children of God. The relationship between the child and their parents is one of the most influential and forming relationships that exist. Ultimately, our relationship with our parents reflects our relationship with God. Today's questions deal with perspective of the child toward the parent. Next week will focus on the parent's perspective.

DIGGING DEEPER:

- 1. Obedience is an essential part of the Christian faith. Jesus Himself was "obedient unto death, even death on a cross" (Philippians 2:8). For Christians, the act of taking up our cross and following Christ is an act of obedience (Matthew 16:24). Obedience is key to the health of the family relationship as well.
- What does it mean to be obedient?
- As you reflect on your own childhood, were you an obedient child? If you have children, are they obedient to you?
- How is the child's obedience toward the parent a reflection of the household's obedience to God?
- What does Paul mean by "obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right"?
- What ill affects can a disobedient child have on a household?
- 2. "Honor your father and mother" is the fifth commandment mentioned in the Ten Commandments. It is the first of the commandments that instructs how we are to relate to others. The first four commandments dealt with how we are to relate to God. It is also the only commandment that comes with a promise.
- As an adult child, what does it look like to honor your father and mother? Is the way you honor your parents different now than it was when you were younger?

- Why is it important to God that we honor our parents?
- How have you honored your parents? (Be specific.)
- What is the nature of the promise connected to this commandment?
- Why might God make His promise conditional on repsectful treatment of one's parents?
- 3. Anger is an emotion that can threaten a relationship, especially if it fuels unforgiveness. The Bible warns us against harboring unrighteous anger and dwelling upon it.
- Children, even adult children, can find themselves struggling with anger toward their parents. What do you feel can be the root of some of this anger?
- How can a child honor their parent even in their anger?
- How can a child's anger toward their parents deter the gospel from being lived out in the family?

TAKING IT HOME:

- 4. A child's relationship with their parent is one of the most influential and forming relationships they will ever experience. How a child is raised will not only affect their future relationships, but more importantly, their relationship with God.
- What is the importance of a child being raised to know and be obedient to the Lord?
- Why does is seem that Paul elevates the importance of the Christian family and its impact in society?
- Has anyone in your group had parents who insisted that their children go to church regularly? What was their motivation? How did it effect the child's relationship with God?
