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1. Familiarize Yourself With the Passage and the Gospels

- a. Read Matthew 20:20-28
- b. Read and study the context around the narrative

- e. Take notice of the places where there is direct discourse (Sometimes the characters words in the story give clues to help us see the main point)

2. Introduction to the Passage (Feel free to use this as a reference guide as you discuss the passage)

- a. <u>Literary Context</u>: As we walk the road of discipleship, spiritual deafness is a legitimate concern for every believer. Prior to Matthew 20:20-28, Jesus warned them about His future. His future held condemnation, flogging, crucifixion, and mockery. Immediately after that intimate moment in Matthew 20:17-19, John and James seek out glory, power, prestige, and honor for themselves (Matthew 20:21). They were unaware of what was to follow in chapter 21 and beyond, where Jesus enters Jerusalem as some kind of hero only to be crucified at the end of the week. They were deaf to the teaching back in Matthew 18:3-4 where Jesus ascribes greatness to being a child. In ancient times, children were not seen as powerful, nor would you ever see a child have a place of honor. Children were seen as weak and helpless creatures in constant need of adults. Spiritual deafness happens when we fail to accurately apply God's truths to our present situation as John and James did.
- b. <u>Historical/Cultural Context:</u> The request from James and John's mother seems to modern readers quite bold and maybe out of place. How can she request such positions over the other 10 disciples? We know from Matthew 27:55, Mark 15:40, and John 19:25, that the mother was the sister to Jesus' mother, which means she was Jesus' aunt who was named Salome. Clearly, there is an expectation of familial privileges. In fact, there are overlapping similarities of this scene with Bathsheba coming to David on behalf of Solomon (1 Kings 1:15-21).¹ The word for "kneeling" is the same word often translated as "worship" (Matthew 14:33). This act of kneeling is typically how one would approach a king.² She thinks her kinship to Jesus and her attitude of reverence will be what it takes to move Jesus' heart in favor of the request.

3. Questions About the Passage

- a. Why do you think James and John's mother asked Jesus for this special privilege? What was the motive?
- b. What is significant about this request, happening after Jesus had told them three times that he would suffer intensely and die?
- c. Why is greatness linked to being a servant or child (Matthew 20:26)? What is the connection between the two?

4. From the Passage to Life

- a. The practical nature of the Christian life seems to be bound up in this idea of serving (Matthew 20:26-28). What is your attitude towards serving others?
- b. The issue of pride and privilege in heaven came up several times in Jesus' ministry among the disciples (Mark 10:41-45; Luke 22:24-30). Do you often look for good things in the Christian life before accepting bad things (i.e. suffering)? How do you feel about the cost to suffer in this life when choosing to follow Jesus?
- c. What do you think of Matthew 20: 26-27's explanation about becoming a slave toward people? To see oneself as a slave means that you view others as more important than yourself. Is this a struggle?
- d. How has Jesus been serving you in your life and how can you serve another person (Matthew 20:28)?
