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1. Familiarize Yourself With the Passage and the Gospel

a. Read John 1:43-51

2. Introduction to the Passage (Feel free to use this as a reference guide as you discuss the passage)

<u>Historical/Literary Context</u>: The name Nathanael means "God gives or God has given" and is the personal name for this disciple.¹ Bartholomew is a "patronymic" name, which identifies Nathanael's family heritage (who he is the son of), Son of Tholomaes or Son of Tolmay.² Nathanael is not mentioned all that often in the gospels outside of the lists except in John 1:43-50 and John 21:2. He was from Cana of Galilee and is said to have translated the gospel of Matthew into Indian and preached the gospel in the country of India. He was beaten profusely and crucified by the unbelievers there.³ It is possible that Nathanael was meditating or seeking God under the fig tree, since rabbi's had a history of studying the Torah (Genesis-Deuteronomy) under fig trees (John 1:50).⁴ Similar to Thomas, Nathanael appears to be quite skeptical, especially after hearing where Jesus grew up, namely Nazareth.

All this to say, Jesus' remark that there is no deceit in him is fascinating, because it reveals something about Nathanael's character, in the midst of his skepticism (John 1:47). Jesus not only had omniscient knowledge about Nathanael's location and movements, but Jesus could see directly into his heart. Nathanael was skeptical, because his knowledge was limited about the Messiah. Once Jesus gave him more evidence, namely his divine omniscience, Nathanael accepted and believed the new information he gained after meeting Jesus, unlike the religious leaders who condemned Jesus after seeing his miraculous power.

3. Questions About the Passage

- a. Why is the observation sitting under the fig tree significant (John 1:50)? (Note Micah 4:4; Zechariah 3:10; 1 Kings 4:25; the Micah and Zechariah passages seem to be messianic prophecies)
- b. Why do you think Jesus' comments prompted Nathanael's response, "You are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!" (John 1:49)?
- c. In John 1:50, what "greater things" was Jesus referring to?

4. From the Passage to Life

- a. Jesus knew what was in Nathanael's heart in a positive way. How is it comforting (positive) and frightening (negative) that God knows our hearts?
- b. Nathanael was quick to acknowledge Jesus' identity when he was faced with it. How quick are you to acknowledge Jesus' workings in your life?
- c. Nathanael was quite careful with who he trusted. He seemed to need evidence before placing trust in someone. How careful are you in regards to false teachers, tv preachers, cults, and people who claim to be preaching Christ? What can we learn from Nathanael in this way?
