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1. Familiarize Yourself With the Passage and the Gospel

- a. Matthew 10:3 (cf. Mark 3:18; Luke 6:15); John 11:16; 14:5; 20:24-28; 21:2
- b. Do a word study on "doubt," since Thomas is widely known as "doubting Thomas." Find all the passages that talk about doubt and see what God's word has to say about it. (Genesis 37:33; Deuteronomy 28:26; Job 12:2; Matthew 14:31; 21:21; 28:17; Mark11:23; Luke 4:23; 24:38; Acts 28:4; Romans 14:23; James 1:6; Jude 22)

Introduction to the Passage (Feel free to use this as a reference guide as you discuss the passage)

Historical/Literary Context: ¹The name Thomas originates from an Aramaic name that means "twin", hence the clarification comment in John 11:16. John also uses the Greek form of the name "twin" with the word "Didymos" (John 20:24; 21:2). Thomas' twin is never clarified in the gospels. A 3rd century text called the Acts of Thomas claims he was the twin brother of Jesus, although this cannot be confirmed in any other reliable sources and is probably doubtful. The Acts of Thomas also contains questionable and contradictory theology compared to the New Testament. Because Thomas is mentioned in a few places in the New Testament, thanks to John the Apostle, we can have a few more definitive observations about Thomas.

While Thomas was most known as a doubter, for good reason, he also displays courage in the face of persecution (John 11:8, 16).² He had a genuine devotion to Christ, even though he lacked understanding that Jesus would rise from the dead as the other disciples thought also leading to his doubt later in the book. Thomas life after the ascension of Jesus is scarce. Some believe he was a missionary in India according to later texts such as the Acts of Thomas, which corresponds to the history of the Syrian church. Others such as the 4th century church historian Eusebius say he was a missionary in Parthia following the tradition of the Egyptian church and the 3rd century theologian Origen. He was most likely martyred like the other disciples.

3. Questions About the Passage

- a. How would you describe Thomas' character and personality from the passages given? (John 11:16; 14:5; 20:24-28)
- b. How should we understand Thomas' comment in John 11:16?
- c. What do you make of the blessing Jesus offers to those who believe in him, but have never seen him (John 20:29)? How is this a blessing?
- d. How do you understand the change of Thomas from passionate martyr (John 11:16), to seeker (John 14:5), to doubter (John 20:25)? Does this speak to Thomas' emotions?

4. From the Passage to Life

- a. How do you see Thomas' devotion and love to Christ in these interactions? What does your devotion and love to Christ look like?
- b. How does Jesus' comment to Thomas comfort him regarding seeing without believing (John 20:26-29)?
- c. Like Thomas, we change in our character. Have you seen a good or bad transformation in your character within your Christian life?
- d. What doubts have plagued your walk with the Lord? What passages from Scripture can help you overcome your doubt?
