Philemon

Message - Paul's request for Philemon to accept Onesimus back into his household because Onesimus is now a useful brother in Christ.

Theme - Our life in Christ can and should change every relationship!

Background - Philemon and Colossians are closely related:

- 1 The were written during Paul's first prison term in Rome, probably around 61 AD.
- 2 The same key people are mentioned in both Colossians and Philemon
 - -Epaphras Col. 1:7, 4:12 and Philemon 23
 - -Mark (John Mark, Barnabas' cousin) Col. 4:10 and Philemon 24
 - -Aristarchus Col. 4:10 (my fellow prisoner) and Philemon 24
 - -Demas Col. 4:14 and Philemon 24
 - -Luke Col 4:14 and Philemon 24
 - -Archippus Col. 4:17 and Philemon 2
 - -Onesimus Col. 4:9 and Philemon 10
- 3 Paul sent the letters of Colossians and Philemon by Tychicus and Onesimus Col. 4:7-

Introduction (1-3)

Paul a prisoner of Christ Jesus – Eight times in his epistles Paul refers to himself as a prisoner of Jesus Christ. This is his only letter that begins with this designation.

The addressees:

Philemon – Probably well to do, converted by Paul (most likely at Ephesus)

Apphia – Probably Philemon's wife (wives often managed the slaves in a wealthy household)

Archippus - Either their son or the interim pastor or both The church in Philemon's house – Even though it is a personal

letter, Paul does not mind it being shared with the church that meets in Philemon's house. <u>Perhaps Paul wants some witnesses!</u>

Grace and Peace – Paul's greeting, used in every letter he wrote!

Praise of Philemon (4-7)

- 1. Thanksgiving for Philemon
- 2. Intercession for Philemon and its content (v. 6)
- 3. Joy and comfort from Philemon (v. 7) The hearts of the saints have been refreshed.

Plea to Philemon (8-17)

- 1. Paul's choice not to command Philemon (v. 8).
- 2. Paul's appeal on behalf of Onesimus (vv. 9-10).
 - -For love's sake
 - -As an old man
 - -As a prisoner of Christ
 - -As Onesimus' spiritual father
- 3. Paul's dispatch of Onesimus (vv. 11-12). Once *useless*, now *useful!* The name Onesimus means "Useful."
- 4. Paul's decision not to detain Onesimus (vv. 13-16).
- 5. Paul's plea (17).

Pledge to Philemon (18-21)

- 1. Charge Onesimus's debts to my account, if he has caused you loss or owes you anything. I give you written guarantee of repayment, but remember that you owe your spiritual life to me!
- 2. Refresh my heart in Christ by letting me gain some benefit from you. Benefit = *oninemi*, a play on the name Onesimus.

Personal Matters (22-25)

- 1. Final Remarks (vv. 22)
- 2. Greetings (vv. 23-24)
- 3. Benediction (v. 25)

Challenge:

- -Who is an Onesimus in your life?
- -Who is a Philemon in your life?
- -Are you a useful servant or a worthless servant?
- -Do you serve God from compulsion or from love?
- -Who in your life do you need to forgive and seek reconciliation? "If possible, so far as it depends on you, be at peace with all men." Rom. 12:18
