- The 144,000 sealed from Israel are special emissaries, protected and sent into the tribulation to evangelize after the church is removed.

6. God's Character and His People

- God's consistent character is to deliver the righteous from judgment (as seen in Genesis 18–19).

- The study concludes that the rapture is not based on believers' merit but on God's unchanging nature to save those who are His.

Practical Encouragements

- **Relax and Trust:** Believers are called to “chill out” and rest in God's love and plans, not to live in fear or anxiety about the end times.
- **Watchfulness and Sobriety:** Christians are to stay spiritually awake, living in faith, love, and hope, assured by the Holy Spirit.
- **Comfort One Another:** The teaching about the rapture and deliverance from wrath is meant for mutual encouragement, not fear.
- **God's Faithfulness:** Even in judgment, God still extends mercy—sending witnesses and providing opportunities for repentance to the very end.

- Gratitude for God's goodness and faithfulness to deliver His people.
- Praise for His mercy, even toward His enemies.
- Assurance that those in Christ are not destined for wrath but are brought into the kingdom of His Son.
