

The Last Day, the Resurrection, and the Hope of Believers

Overview

This message is a Bible study focused on the resurrection, the events of the last day, and the hope Christians have in Christ. The teaching draws from Revelation chapters 19 and 20, Zechariah 12–14, and 1 Thessalonians 4, aiming to clarify the sequence of end-time events and reassure believers about their place in God's plan.

Key Themes and Teachings

Jesus' Return and the Final Battle

- **Revelation 19** describes Jesus returning in glory, leading the armies of heaven, and defeating the forces gathered against God.
- The destruction is not of all humanity, but specifically those who rise against Jerusalem, as also described in Zechariah 14.
- Some people survive these events—those who defect from the Antichrist or are born during this time.

The Thousand Years (Millennium)

- Satan is bound for a thousand years; this time is marked by Christ's rule on earth.
- Those who were martyred for their faith during the tribulation are resurrected and reign with Christ for this period.

- The "rest of the dead" (those not in Christ) do not live again until the thousand years are finished.

The Last Day and Final Judgment

- After the thousand years, Satan is released and deceives the nations again, leading to a final rebellion, which God swiftly ends.
- The great white throne judgment follows. The earth and sky are destroyed; this is the literal "last day" for the present world.
- Only those not found in the Book of Life face judgment based on their deeds; those in Christ are already accounted for in the first resurrection and are not judged at this time.

The Resurrection and Assurance for Believers

- The resurrection is not limited to those alive at Christ's return; all who have died in Christ will be present with Him.
- 1 Thessalonians 4 reassures believers that those who have died will not miss Christ's reign—they are with Him already.
- Paul's teaching is meant to comfort believers, especially those worried they or their loved ones might miss out on God's promises.

Clarifying Misunderstandings About Time and Resurrection

- The phrase "a thousand years is as a day" is sometimes misapplied; God measures time precisely in prophecy.
- The resurrection of believers is not delayed until the very end—those who die in Christ are with Him.
- The teaching addresses confusion or rumors that only those alive at Christ's return will experience His reign.

Practical Encouragement and Hope

- Believers are urged not to fear missing out on God's plan, whether they die before Christ's return or live through tribulation.
- God's grace extends even to those who turn to Him at the last moment, including during the tribulation.
- The resurrection is a promise of new life, not just for the future but as a present hope.
