## 3. Hearing and Doing

- **Not just hearers, but doers:** Citing James, the sermon emphasized that faith must be accompanied by action.
- **Self-examination:** If God seems silent, consider if there is unrepented sin or resistance to His direction.

## 4. Jesus’ True Family

- **Spiritual kinship over blood:** Jesus redefines family as those who hear and do God’s Word, not just those with a natural connection.
- **No favoritism:** New believers are as welcome as those with long histories in the faith.

## 5. Jesus Calms the Storm (Luke 8:22–25)

- **Jesus’ timing:** He often shows up after all other resources are exhausted—when it seems too late.

- **Faith in crisis:** The disciples, facing a swamped boat, discover Jesus' authority over nature. The lesson: it's never too late for Him to act.
- **Stretching our trust:** The story challenges us to expand our faith in what Jesus can do, even when situations seem hopeless.

## 6. Deliverance of the Demoniac (Luke 8:26–39)

- **No case too desperate:** Jesus delivers a man possessed by many demons—someone whom society had given up on.
- **Transformation:** The man is restored, clothed, and in his right mind, becoming a witness to his community.
- **Community's response:** The townspeople, fearful of the cost, ask Jesus to leave, but the healed man is sent as a living testimony.

## Practical Applications

- **Value time with Jesus:** Prioritize spiritual growth and hearing from God before serving others.
- **Respond to God's Word:** Don't just listen—act on what you hear.
- **Don't give up hope:** No situation is too far gone for Jesus. Whether it's a personal crisis or a loved one's struggle, keep asking for His intervention.
- **Count the cost:** Following Jesus means putting Him above all else, even cherished identities or relationships.
- **Be open to God's timing:** Sometimes God seems silent or late, but He is never truly absent or powerless.

- **Thankfulness:** Gratitude for God's faithfulness and for showing His power through both word and deed.
- **Encouragement:** A prayer for faith to trust Jesus in every situation, especially when things seem hopeless.
