Scripture Reading: Philippians 1:21-26 [NKJV]

Introduction:

Here Paul speaks of his personal situation which involved a struggle of sorts regarding his future.

In speaking of his personal <u>situation</u>, he reveals a good deal about his <u>character</u>.

Now for tonight:

Subject: "To Die is Gain"

I. The Devotion of Paul (Philippians 1:21)

Philippians 1:21 (NKJV)

²¹ For to me, to live *is* Christ, and to die *is* gain.

These words reveal a dedication of excellence that is unexcelled in character.

• **The Person in the devotion**. "For to <u>me</u> to live is Christ."

Paul's whole life was wrapped up in the Person of Jesus Christ.

Today many young people idolize some vile entertainer.

Others are devoted to a politician or some other famous person.

But to be devoted to Christ is the greatest of all devotions.

• **The priority in the devotion**. "For to me to live is Christ."

This means that Christ comes first in one's life.

• The passion in the devotion. "Live."

Paul's whole life was devoted to Christ.

• **The purifying from the devotion**. "For to me to live is Christ."

No devotion will so <u>purify</u> one's life as devotion to Christ.

||. The Death of Paul (Philippians 1:21)

Philippians 1:21 (NKJV)

²¹ For to me, to live *is* Christ, and to die *is* gain.

Paul speaks of the blessing [to him] of his death.

• The requirement for such a death. "To die is gain."

Paul could say this because he had met the requirements.

To most people, death will be a horrifying <u>loss</u> because they have not met the requirements for <u>gain</u> in death.

• The reward for such a death. "Gain."

When the redeemed die it is "gain" not loss.

"Gain" includes such blessings as the end of suffering and sorrow (Revelation 21:4).

Revelation 21:4 (NKJV)

⁴ And God will wipe away every tear from their eyes; there shall be no more death, nor sorrow, nor crying. There shall be no more pain, for the former things have passed away."

Also, much exaltation (<u>Revelation 20:6</u>) in that they shall reign with Christ.

Revelation 20:6 (NKJV)

⁶Blessed and holy *is* he who has part in the first resurrection. Over such the second death has no power, but they shall be priests of God and of Christ, and shall reign with Him a thousand years.

III. The Dilemma of Paul (Philippians 1:22-26)

"What I shall choose I wot not... I am in a strait betwixt two" (Philippians 1:22, 23) KJV.

Philippians 1:22-23 (NKJV)

²² But if *I* live on in the flesh, this *will mean* fruit from *my* labor; yet what I shall choose I cannot tell.
²³ For I am hard pressed between the two, having a desire to depart and be with Christ, *which is* far better.

Paul faced a dilemma about living.

· The specifics of the dilemma.

Philippians 1:23-24 (NKJV)

²³ For I am hard pressed between the two, having a desire to depart and be with Christ, *which is* far better. ²⁴ Nevertheless to remain in the flesh *is* more needful for you.

The <u>dilemma</u> was that death was better for him, but to stay alive was better for the Philippian believers.

· The submission in the dilemma.

First, the **priority** in submission. "I shall <u>abide</u> and continue with you" (Philippians 1:25) KJV.

Philippians 1:25 (NKJV)

²⁵ And being confident of this, I know that I shall remain and continue with you all for your progress and joy of faith,

Second, the **price** of the submission.

Philippians 1:26 (NKJV)

²⁶ that your rejoicing for me may be more abundant in Jesus Christ by my coming to you again.

Third, the product of the submission.

Philippians 1:25-26 (NKJV)

²⁵ And being confident of this, I know that I shall

remain and continue with you all for your <u>progress</u> and joy of faith,

²⁶ that your rejoicing for me may be <u>more abundant</u> in Jesus Christ by my coming to you again.

The product of Paul's submission was spiritual benefits for the Philippian believers.
