Opening Prayer:

Begin by asking God to guide your discussion and help everyone understand and apply the truths from this message.

Key Takeaways:

- 1. Our identity as image-bearers of God is not for sale.
- 2. There are three types of people described in Scripture: natural, spiritual, and fleshly/carnal.
- 3. Satan tries to steal three crucial aspects of our identity: a. Our identity as saints b. Our identity as abiding branches of God c. Our identity as connected servants

Discussion Questions:

- 1. What does it mean to be an "image-bearer" of God? How does this impact how we view ourselves and others?
- 2. The speaker mentioned three types of people described in Scripture. Which type do you most identify with currently, and why?
- 3. How have you experienced Satan's attempts to steal or distort your identity in Christ? Share specific examples if you're comfortable.
- 4. Discuss the concept of being a "saint" despite our sins. How does this truth challenge or encourage you?
- 5. Read John 15:1-5. What does it mean to "abide" in Christ? How can we practically do this in our daily lives?



- 6. The speaker emphasized the importance of being connected and serving in a church community. What are some barriers that prevent people from getting involved, and how can we overcome them?
- 7. Reflect on the "butterfly effect" examples shared in the sermon. How does this perspective change the way you view your actions and choices?
- 8. The speaker described what she "sees" when looking at the congregation. How did this section of the sermon impact you? Do you see yourself the way she described?

Practical Applications:

- 9. Identity Affirmation: Take a few minutes each day this week to affirm your identity in Christ. Write down or speak aloud truths about who you are in Him.
- 10. Abiding Practice: Choose one practical way to "abide" in Christ this week (e.g., daily Scripture reading, intentional prayer times, listening to worship music).
- 11. Serving Opportunity: If you're not currently serving in the church, research and pray about one area where you could get involved. If you are serving, consider inviting someone else to join you.
- 12. Generational Impact: Reflect on how your choices and actions might impact future generations. Write a letter to a future descendant describing the legacy of faith you hope to leave.
- 13. Community Building: Reach out to someone in the church this week who might be feeling isolated or disconnected. Invite them for coffee or to join your small group.

Closing Prayer:

Thank God for the identities He has given us in Christ. Ask for His help in living out these truths and impacting others for His kingdom.
