## INTRO

Which costs more today: clear allegiance or staying vague?

Why are some comfortable calling Jesus a "good teacher," but uncomfortable calling Him Lord? Is such neutrality with Jesus possible?

## DIGGING INTO THE TEXT - COLOSSIANS 3:5-11

The reason for the command to "put to death what is earthly in you", is in verses 1-4. Why should we kill these things?

How do the sins listed in verse 5 relate to each other?

What does the apparent progression of sin teach us about putting sexual sin to death?

What does it look like to put away the things listed in verses 8 and 9?

According to verse 9 and 10, those who have died and risen to new life in Christ (v1-4), have already done what? Why should that give us hope?

What is the connection between putting off these practices and renewing our minds?
