INTRO

When you hear lots of people claiming they have the truth about something important, how do you decide who to trust?

DIGGING INTO THE TEXT - COLOSSIANS 1:15-20

- What is the significance of Christ being the head of the church? What tends to take place in churches where Jesus isn't the main focus?
- Christ's resurrection makes two things possible: For men to walk in newness of life (Romans 6:3-4) and for our bodies to be raised from the dead (1 Corinthians 15:22-23). Why is denying the bodily resurrection heresy and not just a small error?
- Read Isaiah 53:10-12 in the NIV, ESV, NKJV and CSB. God was pleased to reconcile all things through Christ's blood (Col. 1:19–20), and it pleased Him to crush Him for our salvation (Isa. 53:10–12). How do you personally wrestle with the tension that the cross is both the most horrific act of injustice in history and the greatest act of God's love and joy?

Key Theological Term: The "Hypostatic Union."

- States that Jesus is truly God and truly man in one person, without mixing, changing, dividing, or separating His two natures.
- **Q.** Why is Jesus being fully God and fully man essential for our salvation and what would be lost if either nature were denied?
- **A.** If Jesus were not truly God, He could not save us. If Jesus were not truly man, He could not represent us.
