### 💡 Highlighted Scriptures

#### Luke 13:18–19 (KJV)

"Then said he, Unto what is the kingdom of God like? and whereunto shall I resemble it? It is like a grain of mustard seed, which a man took, and cast into his garden; and it grew, and waxed a great tree; and the fowls of the air lodged in the branches of it."

James 2:17 (KJV) "Even so faith, if it hath not works, is dead, being alone."

#### 🧠 Summary

Julie Pedroza shares a heartfelt devotional centered on the idea of faith specifically the kind Jesus described as being like a mustard seed. She reflects on Luke 13:18–19 and the tiny yet powerful example of the mustard seed, emphasizing that even a small amount of faith can grow and bear fruit in others' lives. Julie encourages obedience to God, even when it's uncomfortable, and reminds us that stepping out in faith—even in small ways—can have lasting impact. She also references James 2:17 to stress the importance of living out our faith through action.
