The Joy of Abiding in God's Love (Jn. 15:9-11)

I. ABIDING IN GOD'S LOVE

- A. Jesus made a most dramatic announcement—that God loves us in the way that God loves God (Jn. 15:9). Jesus feels the same intensity of love for us that the Father feels for Him. We are to abide in or focus on living in God's love by receiving it then returning it to God and letting it overflow to others. Abiding in love begins by studying and meditating on God's love. This changes how we feel. It exhilarates our hearts with joy and a deep sense of well-being.
 - ⁹<u>As</u> the Father loved Me, I <u>also</u> have loved you; <u>abide in My love</u>. ¹⁰If you <u>keep</u> My commandments, you will abide in My love, just as I have <u>kept</u> My Father's commandments and abide in His love. ¹¹These things I have spoken...that <u>My joy</u> may remain in you. (Jn. 15:9-11)
- B. <u>Keep My commands</u>: Cultivating a spirit of obedience increases our capacity to receive and feel more of God's love. To live in obedience to Jesus is to live in agreement with Him. We love God on His terms. Many want to feel more of God's love, but neglect to live in agreement with God's heart. Sin defiles and dulls our heart and diminishes our capacity to feel and respond to His love.
 - ²¹He who has My commandments and <u>keeps</u> them, it is he who <u>loves Me</u>... (Jn. 14:21)
- C. Jesus defines loving Him and keeping His commandments as more than obeying Him in our morality, speech, and finances. It includes fulfilling the ministry assignment that He gives us.
 - ³⁴My food is to do the will of Him who sent Me, and to finish His work. (Jn. 4:34)
- D. Jesus set His heart on finishing the work that the Father gave Him. This involved long and hard work in ministering to people, speaking unpopular things, and then dying on the cross for us.
 - ⁴I have <u>finished the work</u> which You have given Me... ⁸For I have <u>given to them the words</u> which You have given Me... (Jn. 17:4-8)
- E. Jesus spoke to people out of His loyal love for God. He was not focused on how much He was liked as a preacher or how much popularity He might gain from a "good sermon."
 - ⁶⁰Many of His disciples...said, "This is a <u>hard saying</u>; who can understand it?" ⁶¹When Jesus knew...that His disciples <u>complained</u> about this, He said to them, "Does this <u>offend</u> you?..." ⁶⁶From that time <u>many of His disciples went back</u> and walked with Him no more. (Jn. 6:60-66)

II. KEEPING GOD'S COMMANDS: GODLY CHARACTER AND FINISHING THE WORK

A. We keep God's commandments by our choices for godly character and in doing the work He gives us. Some mistakenly see their ministry assignment as an "optional" part of obeying His commands and loving Him. It is more than an optional addendum that we embrace to gain affirmation. We must not quit because He requires that we express our love to Him in this way.

- ¹⁰If you <u>keep My commandments</u>, you will abide in My love, <u>just as I have kept</u> My Father's commandments and abide in His love. (Jn. 15:10)
- B. At the end of his life, Paul was confident that he had finished the work the Lord had given him.

 6My departure [death] is at hand. 7I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race...
 (2 Tim. 4:6-7)
 - 1. <u>Godly character</u>: To finish his assignment required discipline in Paul's actions.

 24 Run in such a way that you may obtain it [the prize]...26 I run thus: not with uncertainty...27 But I <u>discipline my body</u> and bring it into subjection, lest, when I have preached to others, I myself should become disqualified. (1 Cor. 9:24-27)
 - 2. <u>Hard work</u>: To finish his assignment required diligence in Paul's ministry labors.

 10 <u>I labored more abundantly</u> than they all, yet not I, but the grace of God...with me. (1 Cor. 15:10)
 - 3. <u>Bearing reproach</u>: To finish his assignment, Paul had to speak out the unpopular truths of the Word. He bore Jesus' reproach, sharing the fellowship of His suffering (Phil. 3:10).

 20 I kept back nothing that was helpful, but proclaimed it to you...²³the Holy Spirit testifies...that chains and tribulations await me. ²⁴But none of these things move me; nor do I count my life dear to myself, so that I may finish my race with joy...²⁷I have not shunned to declare to you the whole counsel of God... (Acts 20:20-27)
- C. Loving God involves "running the race," which means fulfilling the assignment that He sets before us. God gives each of us "a work," a specific ministry assignment, to complete in our life.

 1 Let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily ensures us, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, 2 looking unto Jesus. (Heb. 12:1-2)
- D. It is a challenge to be faithful in our ministry assignment when we have only a small measure of God's manifest presence in our work, a small amount of resources, and a small response from people we serve, along with the pressures of difficult circumstances and relational conflicts.

 17 Well done...you were faithful in a very little, have authority over ten cities. (Lk. 19:17)
 - ²¹You were <u>faithful over a few things</u>, I will make you ruler over many things. (Mt. 25:21)
- E. Jesus was faithful though he saw little response from the people He ministered to (Isa. 49). He focused on being faithful to God, not on how much the people responded.
 - ³And He [the Father] said to Me [Jesus], "You are My servant...in whom I will be glorified." ⁴Then I said, "I have labored in vain, I have spent my strength for nothing and in vain [from man's point of view]; yet surely my just reward is with the LORD." (Isa. 49:3-4)

- F. Jesus knew that God's eyes were upon Him and that His reward was delayed until the age to come, when the nations of the earth would accept His leadership and salvation in the Millennium.
 - ⁵I shall be glorious in the <u>eyes of the LORD</u>...⁶Indeed He says, "It is too small a thing that You should...restore the preserved ones of Israel; I will also give You as a light to the Gentiles, that <u>You should be My salvation to the ends of the earth</u>." (Isa. 49:5-6)
