Assurance of Pardon

- Read1 John 4:9-10
- Thank God for the blood of Jesus.

God's Grace for the Undeserving

Jonah 4:1-11

- 1) Has there ever been a time in your life when you were angry at God? Talk about that situation and the reasons why you thought you were right and, maybe, God was wrong or unjust in dealing with you.
- 2) Why do you think we, as Christians, have a hard time, sometimes, wanting (or hoping) that God sees things from our perspective rather than us seeing things from His?
- 3) Jonah's story ends with Jonah trying to prove a point to God. He's hoping that God will wind up being wrong about the Ninevites. In what ways or circumstances have you responded to God in this way?
- 4) The big truth from Jonah chapter four is that it is impossible for me to care about the things God cares about when all I care about is myself. How have you seen this truth in your life or in the lives of others?
- 5) Jonah cared more about the sin of the Ninevites rather than his own sin. How is this a temptation in our lives?



"...may I not care about the great city of Nineveh, which has more than a hundred twenty thousand people who cannot distinguish between their right and their left, as well as many animals?"

- 6) Jonah cared more about what benefited him rather than what glorified God. How has this been a temptation for you?
- 7) Jonah cared more about his preferences than he did the lost. How can churches fall prey to this and what is the result? How can we fight against this?
- 8) Think about the last few weeks we've spent in the book of Jonah. Where has God showed you areas of your life where you are like Jonah?
