# Face to Faith: Conversations in the Gospel of John

# Week 4 — John 9:35-41 — The Man Born Blind

All Scripture references NIV

### **Before You Begin**

Pray: "Lord, open my eyes to see You clearly, soften my heart to receive Your Word, and lead me to respond in worship and obedience."

## Scripture Reading (NIV)

Primary Passage: John 9:35–41 (read in your Bible or app). For context, read John 9:1–34. Memory Verse: *"Then the man said, 'Lord, I believe,' and he worshiped him."* (John 9:38, NIV)

### **Sermon Summary**

Jesus and His disciples encounter a man blind from birth (John 9:1). The disciples assume a cause—and–effect between sin and suffering. Jesus rejects their assumption and reframes the moment: this man's condition will showcase God's work (9:3).

Jesus heals with a personal touch—mud and washing at Siloam. The man returns seeing. Neighbors are astonished, and religious leaders interrogate him. He simply testifies: "One thing I do know. I was blind but now I see!" (9:25).

When the healed man is excommunicated, Jesus finds him and leads him to saving faith (9:35–38). The man responds with belief and worship. Jesus then exposes spiritual blindness: those who insist they can 'see' on their own remain in guilt (9:39–41).

# **Key Takeaways**

- His Compassion Is Unending: Jesus dispels shame and draws near to the outcast. He not only
  heals but seeks the man after rejection—compassion that restores dignity and belonging (Psalm
  27:10).
- **His Power Is Overwhelming:** Jesus gives physical sight and, greater still, spiritual sight. God's power is displayed through healing and, at times, through sustained weakness that magnifies His grace (2 Corinthians 12:9–10).
- **His Glory Is Revealing:** The presence of Jesus demands a response. Our reaction to His self–revelation exposes our hearts—humble faith leads to worship; prideful certainty leaves us blind (John 9:39–41).

#### **Self-Guided Discussion Guide**

#### **Observe & Interpret**

- 1 What assumptions do the disciples make about suffering in John 9:1–2? How does Jesus correct them (9:3)?
- 2 Trace the healed man's growing understanding of Jesus (9:11, 9:17, 9:33, 9:38). What changes at each step?
- 3 Where do you see contrast between physical sight and spiritual sight in 9:39–41?

#### Reflect

- 1 Where have you carried a 'shame cloud' like the blind man—believing your struggle proves God's displeasure? What does Jesus' response reveal about His heart?
- 2 When have you experienced God's power more in weakness than in instant relief? How did that shape your trust?
- 3 What typically keeps you from responding in worship or obedience when Jesus makes Himself known?

#### **Apply**

- **Compassion:** Identify one person who feels sidelined or shunned. Initiate a simple act of mercy this week (check-in, meal, prayer).
- Witness: Practice the healed man's testimony in one sentence: "One thing I do know..." (John 9:25). Share it with someone.
- **Worship**: Take one step outside your comfort zone in corporate worship or private devotion that meaningfully expresses surrender to Jesus.
