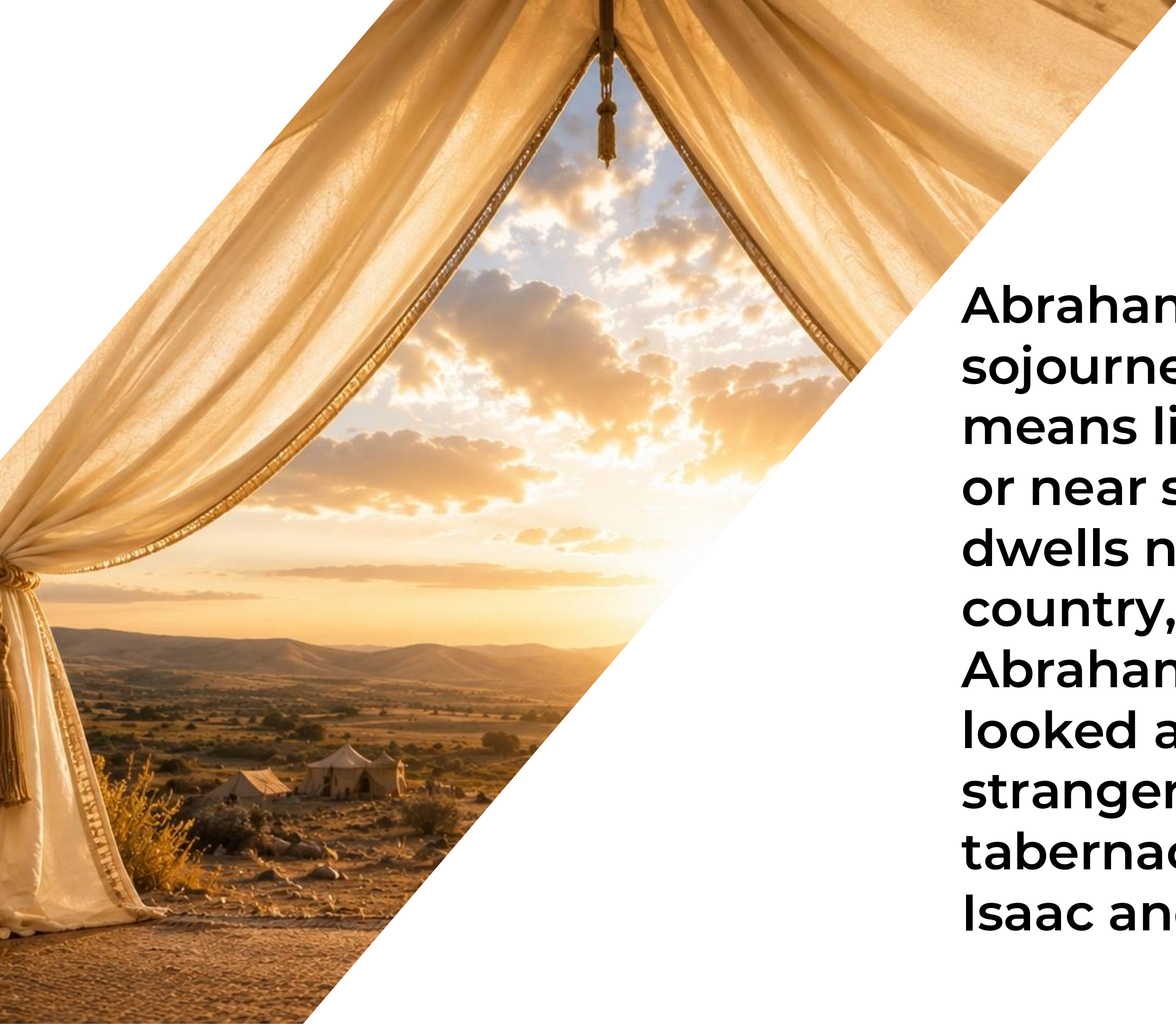
♦ STEPPING OUTSIDE THE TENT ♦



Abraham was accustomed to living in tents. He was said to have a tent dwelling life. His life embodied the ultimate pilgrim mentality. The New Testament highlights that he looked for "a city which hath foundations, whose builder and maker is God.







**Abraham was a stranger, a sojourner. To be a stranger means literally to dwell beside or near someone. A stranger dwells near the people of his country, never with them. Abraham was no mixer. He looked and acted like a stranger. He dwelt in tabernacles or tents, as did Isaac and Jacob.**





**Although the whole land was his by promise, nothing was his by reality. He settled nowhere; he built no city anywhere. He chose to live in a tent. A tent, we understand, emphasizes the idea of the temporary.**



Holy Spirit desires to encourage many of you who are navigating changes, feeling disconnected to your promise right now. There may be a lot of moving parts. It may feel dark, and hard to see what is happening. But the curtains are drawing back.

It will be evident soon that all along, God has been preparing you for more.







**Enlarge the place of your tent" is a biblical mandate that instructs you to broaden your horizons, increase your capacity, and prepare for future growth.**



**It was only when Abraham pushed aside the tent flaps that he could see further.**



**What God ordains, He schedules. What He schedules, He fulfills. When God gives us a fresh vision, it is not that He has suddenly changed His mind. He hasn't rewritten the story of our lives. The Father's purpose was always there. He had already established His plan. And now, He is revealing to us more of the picture.**

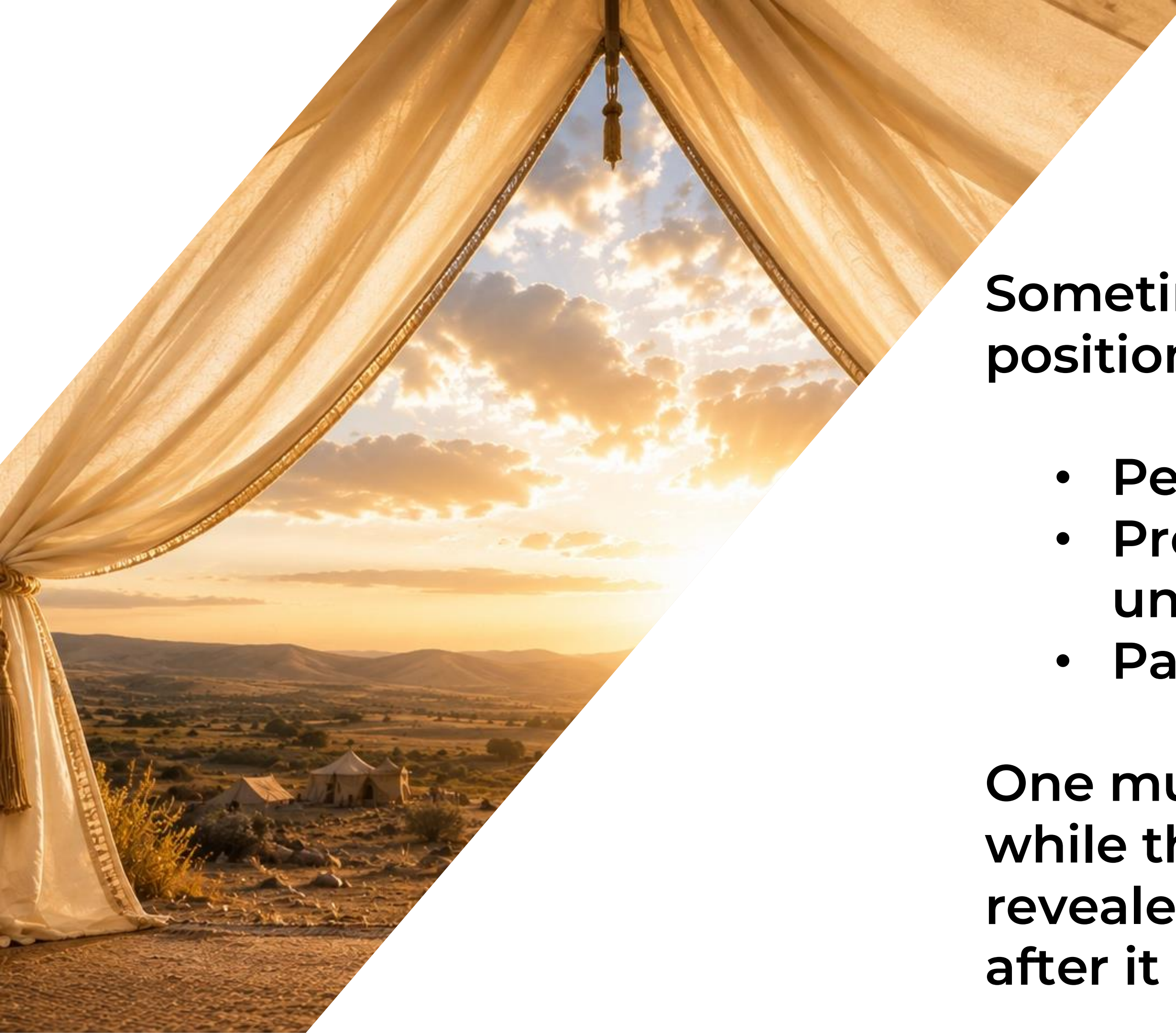




**The Greek word apokalypsis, often translated as “revelation” in the New Testament, means an uncovering or an unveiling. It describes something hidden being brought into view. So, when God is revealing a bigger picture, we must position ourselves to see it?**







**Sometimes that place of position can be:**

- **Peril unexpected**
- **Predicaments that seem unrelenting**
- **Pain that's unimaginable**

**One must wait for victory while the vision is being revealed. A vision only talks after it has tarried.**



## **Habakkuk 2:3 KJV**

**For the vision is yet for an appointed time, but at the end it shall speak, and not lie: though it tarry, wait for it; because it will surely come, it will not tarry.**

**This verse speaks to the tension between promise and fulfillment. God had given Habakkuk a vision, but the fulfillment was not immediate. The prophet was instructed to trust God's timing rather than his own expectations.**







**The vision may be waiting for:**

- **The right people**
- **The right resources**
- **The right alignment**
- **The right season**





**“The vision has an appointed time. The plans may seem larger than our present capacity, the process may appear slower than we hoped, but what God has spoken will speak for itself. The vision will not lie. We must remain faithful because what seems to tarry today will talk tomorrow. It will arrive in God’s appointed season.**



The vision is not dependent on favorable circumstances; it is dependent on the faithfulness of the One who gave it.

- The vision may outlive the excitement of its announcement.
- There may be seasons when resources seem insufficient.
- There may be opposition, fatigue, or unanswered questions.
- Yet God says, “Wait for it.” And prepare to walk into it.
