Scripture: Isaiah 40:21-31 Key Focus: Isaiah and Exile Notes:

- **2.** What are three descriptions that Isaiah gives to describe God as the creator of the universe in (vv. 21-22 and vv 25-26)?
 - · Which one sticks out to you as awe-inspiring?
- **3.** What images does Isaiah use to describe God's control over the world's powers and politics in v. 23-24?
 - This is a common theme in the Bible that is often overlooked.
 For instance, Psalm 2:4 says that God "laughs" and "scoffs" at the world's powers and governments for thinking that they are in control.
 - If true, what effect do you think this had on Isaiah's original audience in exile?
 - How might this bring us peace as we face our country's current political disagreements and controversies?
- **4.** What does it say about God that he allows his people to go through suffering like the exile?
 - What is one reaction that God hopes that we will have in response to our suffering?
 - How do you feel that this is part of God's love for us?
 - If you need help, look up Luke 15:13-20, 2 Corinthians 7:10, or Isaiah 48:10.
- **5.** Pastor Daryl mentioned several emotions or questions about God that exile would have produced in the Israelites. For example: feeling like you don't belong, forgotten, confused, sad, powerless, unseen, alone, anxious, homeless, angry, or just longing for something more.
 - Is there one of these that you identify with the most?
 - How might God's promises in vv. 28-31 and Jesus' offering of a new home help us face those emotions or questions?
