- 1. The disciples are asking for an explanation of the blindness, and Jesus's answer is given as an explanation of the blindness.
- 2. God knows all things.
- 3. Any attempt to deny God's sovereign, purposeful control over conception and birth is in total conflict with Exodus 4:11 and Psalm 139:13.

Exodus 4:11

The Lord said to him, "Who gave a mouth to man, or who makes a person mute or deaf or seeing or blind? Is it not I, the Lord?

Psalm 139:13

"Certainly you made my mind and heart; you wove me together in my mother's womb"

Purpose: Revealing The Acts Of God

Real Meaning Found In God

Showcasing Both God In Healing And Not Healing

What does this have to do with me?

Verse 4

"We must perform the deeds of the one who sent me as long as it is daytime. Night is coming when no one can work"

- 1. The acts of God referred to in verse 3 will be done through Jesus. Jesus is going to heal this man's blindness. The acts of God are the acts of Jesus.
- 2. He must do this quickly, because night is coming, and his time will be over. Jesus will turn from healing to dying. He will turn from the day-work of relieving these things, and do the night-work of dying and suffering.
- 3. The real explanation is: Jesus is suffering that the acts of God might be revealed in Him.
