How to Use This Guide:

1. Read every assigned passage in your Bible before reading the summary. The guide assumes the CSB used in the sermon series, but the questions are designed to work from any faithful biblical translation.
2. Answer from the text and the sermon notes before moving to personal reflection. Observation comes before application.
3. Be concrete. A faithful next step is usually more useful than a vague intention to 'do better.'
4. Use the guide individually or in a small group. No answer key or leader notes are included.
5. Don't rush the final synthesis pages. They are designed to help the separate passages form one coherent theology of endurance, dependence, comfort, and resurrection hope.

KEYSTUDYTERMS&GUARDRAILS

- **ENDURANCE:** *Continued allegiance to God under pressure. It is more than passing the time until a circumstance ends.*
- **ENTRUST:** *Placing yourself and the outcome into the care of the faithful Creator while continuing to do what is good.*
- **DEPENDENCE:** *Reliance on God rather than self-sufficiency. Biblical dependence includes receiving help from God's people.*
- *Don't make human suffering redemptive in the atoning sense. Christ's suffering saves us; ours doesn't.*
- *Don't presume to know God's hidden purpose behind every tragedy or pressure another person with your explanation.*
- *Don't confuse dependence on God with isolation from people. Paul receives prayer and comfort through the church.*
- *Don't rush sufferers into ministry usefulness. Receiving comfort may be the faithful work of a season.*

UNIT 01: WHEN SUFFERING LINGERS

Primary Reading Range: 1 Peter 1–4; Romans 8:18–27; Hebrews 11:32–40

BEFORE YOU BEGIN UNIT 01: What do you already believe, assume, or fear about enduring lingering pain?

UNIT 01 | STUDY 01: FAITHFULNESS AND PAIN CAN OCCUPY THE SAME LIFE

Let Peter correct the assumption that genuine faith and painful circumstances can't exist in the same life.

READ THE TEXT: (1 Peter 4:12; 1 Peter 1:3–9; Romans 8:18–27) Read the passage from your Bible before continuing. Mark repeated words, commands, promises, descriptions of God, and statements of allegiance.

SUMMARY

Peter tells suffering believers not to treat the fiery ordeal as proof that something spiritually impossible is happening. He doesn't minimize their pain. He corrects the assumption that God's presence and painful circumstances can't occupy the same life. Earlier in the letter, Peter located their grief inside a larger reality: new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus. Romans 8 broadens the horizon. Creation groans, believers groan, and the Spirit helps us in weakness while we wait for the redemption of our bodies.

KEYTHOUGHT

Pain and God's presence can occupy the same life. Suffering isn't proof that God's plan has failed.

START WITH THE TEXT (OBSERVATION & TEXTUAL FOCUS)

1. What assumption does Peter address in 1 Peter 4:12, and how does he instruct believers to respond to fiery trials?

2. How does 1 Peter 1:3–9 describe the living hope and the purpose of refined faith under trial?

UNDERSTAND AND CONNECT (THEOLOGICAL SYNTHESIS)

3. How does the resurrection of Jesus give meaning for us to define and understand suffering in 1 Peter 1?

4. According to Romans 8:18–27, who or what groans, what are believers waiting for, and what does the Spirit do in weakness?

GO DEEPER | GRIEF AND HOPE

Peter doesn't require emotional denial. Christian joy isn't delight in loss or pain. The object of joy is God's mercy, the resurrection of Jesus, and the promised future. Romans 8 likewise allows groaning and hope to occupy the same life. Weakness, lament, and hope are not mutually exclusive.

BRING IT BEFORE GOD (PERSONAL REFLECTION & APPLICATION)

5. What conclusions about God are you most tempted to draw from the length or intensity of a hard circumstance?

6. How can you tell the truth about pain without allowing pain to become the final interpreter of God or your future?

PRACTICE THIS CONCRETELY: Write two short statements about one present difficulty: first, what the circumstance seems to say; second, what the resurrection of Jesus allows you to say that the circumstance can't see.

PRAYER RESPONSE: Lament honestly before God. Thank Him for the living hope secured through Jesus' resurrection, and ask the Spirit to help you in weakness while you wait. Write your prayer below.

UNIT 01 | STUDY 02: ENDURANCE IS CONTINUED ALLEGIANCE

See endurance as fidelity to Jesus under pressure, not emotional numbness or automatic toughness.

READ THE TEXT: (1 Peter 4:13–16; 1 Peter 2:21–25) Read the passage from your Bible before continuing. Mark repeated words, commands, promises, descriptions of God, and statements of allegiance.

SUMMARY

Peter's immediate setting matters. He speaks especially about shame, ridicule, and pressure that come because believers bear the name of Christ. He carefully distinguishes this from suffering caused by wrongdoing. In that setting, endurance becomes a question of loyalty: *will pressure determine who I belong to?* Peter points to Jesus, who suffered unjustly and entrusted Himself to the One who judges rightly. Christ's suffering is unique in its saving work, yet the crucified and risen Savior also shows His people what faithful trust looks like under pressure.

KEY THOUGHT

Endurance doesn't mean suffering no longer hurts. It means suffering doesn't get to choose your Lord.

START WITH THE TEXT (OBSERVATION & TEXTUAL FOCUS)

1. What kinds of suffering does Peter distinguish in 1 Peter 4:13–16, and why does the distinction matter?

2. What does Peter say about the name of Christ, shame, glory, and the Spirit in 1 Peter 4:13–16?

UNDERSTAND AND CONNECT (THEOLOGICAL SYNTHESIS)

3. What actions of Jesus in 1 Peter 2:21–25 form a pattern for faithful response under unjust pressure?

4. Why is it important to say both that Christ's suffering saves us and that His faithful trust provides a pattern for disciples?

GO DEEPER | CHRIST SAVES; WE FOLLOW

First Peter 2:21–25 must be handled carefully. Jesus isn't just an example. He bore our sins, and His suffering accomplishes what ours never can. Yet the Savior who suffered for us also entrusts Himself to the Father and becomes the pattern of faithful trust. His cross and resurrection shape Christian endurance without turning our suffering into atonement.

BRING IT BEFORE GOD (PERSONAL REFLECTION & APPLICATION)

5. Where are you currently experiencing pressure to compromise allegiance, withdraw in shame, or act out of bitterness?

6. What would it look like to entrust yourself and your reputation to the One who judges justly in that situation?

PRACTICE THIS CONCRETELY: Identify one situation where pressure tempts you to compromise. Write out one concrete act of continued allegiance to Jesus.

PRAYER RESPONSE: Thank Jesus for bearing your sins and rising from the dead. Ask for courage to remain identified with Him and for awareness of the Spirit of glory who rests on His people. Write your prayer below.

UNIT 01 | STUDY 03: FAITH ISN'T MEASURED BY IMMEDIATE DELIVERANCE

Refuse the false equation that being delivered in a timely fashion means you have strong faith and if you are still suffering that you have weak faith.

READ THE TEXT: 1 Peter 4:17–19; Hebrews 11:32–40; Romans 8:23–25 — Read the passage from your Bible before continuing. Mark repeated words, commands, promises, descriptions of God, and statements of allegiance.

SUMMARY

Hebrews 11 provides a striking contrast: some by faith conquered kingdoms and escaped the sword, while others by faith suffered torture, mocking, and death. All were commended for faith, yet none received the final fulfillment in their earthly lifetime. Peter concludes chapter 4 by commanding those who suffer according to God's will to entrust their souls to a faithful Creator while continuing to do good. Present relief isn't the sole scorecard of faith.

KEY THOUGHT

Present circumstances are not God's final courtroom. Faithfulness can't be measured only by whether relief comes now.

START WITH THE TEXT (OBSERVATION & TEXTUAL FOCUS)

1. In Hebrews 11:32–40, list the two broad kinds of earthly outcomes experienced by people who are all commended for faith.

2. What two actions belong together in 1 Peter 4:19? What does each action prevent us from doing?

UNDERSTAND AND CONNECT (THEOLOGICAL SYNTHESIS)

3. How does Hebrews 11 challenge the idea that the outcome of a prayer can be used as a spiritual scorecard?

4. How does resurrection hope allow a promise of God to remain trustworthy even when death appears to interrupt its fulfillment?

GO DEEPER | 'SAVED WITH DIFFICULTY'

First Peter 4:18 doesn't mean Jesus barely manages to save His people. The difficulty belongs to the road God's people may travel, not to weakness in the Savior. Peter's contrast between God's household and those who disobey the gospel should keep us from treating present hardship as proof that salvation has failed.

BRING IT BEFORE GOD (PERSONAL REFLECTION & APPLICATION)

5. Where are you tempted to interpret continuing suffering as evidence of weak faith, unanswered prayer, or divine abandonment?

6. What would it mean to keep praying for relief while also praying, 'Lord, keep me faithful while I am still in this'?

PRACTICE THIS CONCRETELY: Write both prayers together: one honest prayer asking God to change the circumstance and one prayer asking Him to keep you faithful if the circumstance remains.

PRAYER RESPONSE: Entrust your soul and circumstances to the faithful Creator. Ask for grace to keep doing good when relief is delayed. Write your prayer below.

UNIT 01 REVIEW: WHEN SUFFERING LINGERS

UNIT 02: BEYOND OUR STRENGTH

Primary Reading Range: 2 Corinthians 1:8–11; James 1:2–12; 1 Kings 19:1–21

BEFORE YOU BEGIN UNIT 02: What do you assume or fear about reaching the limit of your own capacity?

UNIT 02 | STUDY 04: TESTED FAITH CAN FORM ENDURANCE

Understand how tested faith leads to spiritual wholeness, wisdom, and active dependence.

READ THE TEXT: (James 1:2–12) Read the passage from your Bible before continuing. Mark repeated words, commands, promises, descriptions of God, and statements of allegiance.

SUMMARY

James doesn't say pain automatically produces maturity. He says the testing of faith produces **endurance**, and he calls believers to let endurance have its full effect so that they move toward maturity and wholeness. The next statement is significant: ***if anyone lacks wisdom, ask God***. Maturity isn't self-sufficiency. It includes recognizing what we lack and knowing where to turn. James doesn't promise an explanation for every trial, but he does promise that God gives wisdom generously to those who ask in faith.

KEYTHOUGHT

The maturing Christian isn't the person who needs nothing. The maturing Christian increasingly knows his need and discerns what to ask from God.

START WITH THE TEXT (OBSERVATION & TEXTUAL FOCUS)

1. Trace James 1:2–4 in order. What is tested, what is produced, and what is the stated goal?

2. What does James tell the believer who lacks wisdom to do, and what does he say about God's manner of giving?

UNDERSTAND AND CONNECT (THEOLOGICAL SYNTHESIS)

3. Why is it important to distinguish 'pain produces maturity' from 'the testing of faith produces endurance'?

4. What is the difference between asking God for an exhaustive explanation and asking Him for wisdom?

GO DEEPER | PAIN isn't MAGIC

Suffering can harden, frighten, isolate, or embitter. Scripture doesn't treat pain as automatically sanctifying. James places the emphasis on faith being tested and endurance being allowed to work. This keeps us from romanticizing suffering while still affirming that God can form His people within it.

BRING IT BEFORE GOD (PERSONAL REFLECTION & APPLICATION)

5. What question are you currently asking God that begins with 'Why'? What wisdom question might need to accompany it?

6. Complete this prayer in your own words: 'God, what does faithfulness look like here when it comes to...'

PRACTICE THIS CONCRETELY: Choose one unresolved circumstance. Ask God for wisdom, then name one next obedient step that doesn't depend on understanding the entire reason for the trial.

PRAYER RESPONSE: Ask the generous God for wisdom. Ask that endurance would form a more integrated, faithful life rather than merely a higher pain tolerance. Write your prayer below.

UNIT 02 | STUDY 05: BEYOND OUR STRENGTH

Let Paul replace the ideal of hidden human capacity with dependence on the God who raises the dead.

READ THE TEXT: (2 Corinthians 1:8–11) Read the passage from your Bible before continuing. Mark repeated words, commands, promises, descriptions of God, and statements of allegiance.

SUMMARY

Paul describes the affliction in Asia as completely **overwhelming** and **beyond** his strength. He doesn't pretend he's discovered unused reserves of personal toughness. He says the experience pressed him away from trusting in himself and toward trusting in God who raises the dead. Paul then speaks of God's deliverance across past, present, and future expectation, while also acknowledging the Corinthians' help through prayer. The center of Christian endurance isn't a stronger self. It is the God whose power reaches beyond death.

KEY THOUGHT

The center of Christian endurance isn't a stronger self. It is the God whose power reaches beyond death.

START WITH THE TEXT (OBSERVATION & TEXTUAL FOCUS)

1. How does Paul describe the severity of his affliction in Asia in 2 Corinthians 1:8–9?

2. According to verse 9, what was the divine purpose behind being pressed beyond human capacity?

UNDERSTAND AND CONNECT (THEOLOGICAL SYNTHESIS)

3. How does Paul hold together absolute dependence on God with the practical help of the church's prayers in verse 11?

4. What is the difference between self-reliant toughness and resurrection-anchored hope?

GO DEEPER | THE GOD WHO RAISES THE DEAD

Paul says his ultimate confidence is in the resurrection. Christian hope isn't optimistic self-talk that bad things won't happen; it's the firm conviction that nothing, not even death, can place us beyond the redemptive power of God.

BRING IT BEFORE GOD (PERSONAL REFLECTION & APPLICATION)

5. Where have you quietly assumed that maturity means needing less help from God or from other believers?

6. What would dependence look like in one area where you are currently beyond your own capacity?

PRACTICE THIS CONCRETELY: Name one burden you can't carry by strength alone. Write one act of God-directed dependence and one act of community-directed dependence you will practice this week.

PRAYER RESPONSE: Bring God the place where your strength has failed. Confess self-reliance without shame, and place your hope in the God who raises the dead. Write your prayer below.

UNIT 02 | STUDY 06: THE JOURNEY IS TOO MUCH FOR YOU

Watch how God meets Elijah in severe limits without pretending those limits are unreal.

READ THE TEXT: (1 Kings 19:1–21) Read the passage from your Bible before continuing. Mark repeated words, commands, promises, descriptions of God, and statements of allegiance.

SUMMARY

After Mount Carmel, Jezebel threatens Elijah's life. He runs, enters the wilderness, sits beneath a broom tree, and asks to die. The narrative presents a faithful servant at the end of his strength and perspective. God's first recorded response is remarkably a physical one: Elijah sleeps, receives food and water, sleeps again, and is fed again because the journey is too much for him. At Horeb, Elijah names genuinely painful realities, but God reveals that Elijah doesn't see everything that is true. Seven thousand remain, Elisha will walk with him, and God's work continues beyond Elijah's ability to carry it alone. God simply says, "You're not alone."

KEY THOUGHT

Elijah sees something true, but he doesn't see everything that is true. Faithfulness isn't the same thing as indispensability.

START WITH THE TEXT (OBSERVATION & TEXTUAL FOCUS)

1. Trace Elijah's physical and emotional condition in 1 Kings 19:1–8. What does the text explicitly say, and what should we avoid adding to it?

2. What does God provide before giving Elijah a renewed assignment?

UNDERSTAND AND CONNECT (THEOLOGICAL SYNTHESIS)

3. What parts of Elijah's complaint are true, and what realities does God reveal that Elijah can't currently see?

4. What does the calling of Elisha communicate about shared work, succession, and the limits of Elijah's indispensability?

GO DEEPER | LIMITS, PERSPECTIVE, AND VOCATION

Obviously, the passage doesn't give Elijah a modern clinical diagnosis, so the safest reading is to describe what the narrative itself shows: fear, exhaustion, despair, isolation, and a desire to die. God's response acknowledges human limitations, then widens Elijah's field of vision to see more of what God is doing. God's mission is larger than one exhausted servant, and continued faithfulness may sometimes include receiving help, provision, companionship, and a changed assignment.

BRING IT BEFORE GOD (PERSONAL REFLECTION & APPLICATION)

5. What are you carrying as though everything will collapse if you stop, slow down, or receive help?

6. Where might faithfulness in the next season require a change of pace, role, assignment, or companionship?

PRACTICE THIS CONCRETELY: Choose one limit you have been resisting. Name one faithful way to receive provision or let another person walk beside you rather than pretending the journey isn't too much.

PRAYER RESPONSE: Thank God that His work is larger than your capacity. Ask Him for provision, truthful perspective, and humility to receive the help or change of assignment He gives.

UNIT 02 REVIEW: BEYOND OUR STRENGTH

1. Why is 'the testing of your faith produces endurance' more careful than saying 'pain makes you stronger'?

2. What does Paul mean when he says the affliction was beyond his strength, and where does he relocate confidence?

3. What does Elijah's story teach about physical limits, narrowed perspective, shared work, and changing assignments?

4. What is one concrete act of dependence you will practice from Unit 02?

UNIT 03: COMFORTED PEOPLE COMFORT PEOPLE

Primary Reading Range: 2 Corinthians 1:3–7, 11; 2 Corinthians 7:5–7; 1 Peter 4:19

BEFORE YOU BEGIN UNIT 03: What do you assume or feel when someone else is suffering or when you need comfort?

UNIT 03 | STUDY 07: THE GOD OF ALL COMFORT

See comfort as something God gives in affliction and then makes available through His people.

READ THE TEXT: (2 Corinthians 1:3–7) Read the passage from your Bible before continuing. Mark repeated words, commands, promises, descriptions of God, and statements of allegiance.

SUMMARY

Paul begins the passage by praising the Father of mercies and the God of all comfort. Then he says God comforts us in all our affliction so that we may be able to comfort those who are in any affliction with the comfort we ourselves receive from Him. Paul doesn't say, 'I suffered, so now I'm an expert on *your* suffering.' He says God comforted him, and what he received from God can now become something carried toward another. God remains the source.

KEYTHOUGHT

God remains the source of comfort. We carry His comfort toward others, not our own expert authority.

START WITH THE TEXT (OBSERVATION & TEXTUAL FOCUS)

1. List every reference to comfort, affliction, suffering, endurance, or sharing in 2 Corinthians 1:3–7. What relationships do you see among them?

2. What does Paul say God's comfort enables believers to do?

UNDERSTAND AND CONNECT (THEOLOGICAL SYNTHESIS)

3. Why is it theologically important to keep God as the source of comfort rather than treating personal experience as the source?

4. How does patient endurance in verse 6 connect comfort with more than momentary relief?

GO DEEPER | COMFORT isn't EXPLANATION

The passage doesn't say that comfort requires explaining why another person is suffering. It doesn't turn your story into their template or your answered prayer into a promise about their outcome. Biblical comfort can include truth, hope, prayer, presence, patience, mercy, and companionship without claiming access to God's hidden reasons.

BRING IT BEFORE GOD (PERSONAL REFLECTION & APPLICATION)

5. When someone suffers, are you more likely to offer presence or explanations? What does that reveal about your instincts?

6. How can you guard against turning your personal story or healing timeline into a rigid template for someone else?

PRACTICE THIS CONCRETELY: Write one statement of comfort grounded in God's character rather than an attempt to explain a mystery.

PRAYER RESPONSE: Praise the Father of mercies and God of all comfort. Ask Him to make you a steward of His comfort without trying to explain what He has not revealed. Write your prayer below.

UNIT 03 | STUDY 08: COMFORT ARRIVES THROUGH PEOPLE

Let Titus teach you that dependence on God isn't independence from the people of God.

READ THE TEXT: (2 Corinthians 7:5–7; 2 Corinthians 1:11) Read the passage from your Bible before continuing. Mark repeated words, commands, promises, descriptions of God, and statements of allegiance.

SUMMARY

Paul describes arriving in Macedonia with conflict outside and fears within. Then he says that God, who comforts the downcast, comforted them by the arrival of Titus and by the report Titus carried from the Corinthians. Earlier, Paul had also described the Corinthians as helping through prayer. These texts make divine comfort concrete. God's sufficiency doesn't compete with ordinary human presence. Prayer, a visit, encouragement, practical help, Scripture, a meal, or someone who simply remains can become means through which God's comfort is made tangible.

KEY THOUGHT

God's sufficiency doesn't compete with ordinary human presence; it often becomes tangible through it.

START WITH THE TEXT (OBSERVATION & TEXTUAL FOCUS)

1. In 2 Corinthians 7:5–7, how does Paul describe his internal and external condition upon arriving in Macedonia?

2. What human means did God use to bring comfort to Paul and his companions?

UNDERSTAND AND CONNECT (THEOLOGICAL SYNTHESIS)

3. How does Titus' arrival show that divine comfort often comes through ordinary relationships and presence?

4. What does 2 Corinthians 1:11 reveal about the necessity of mutual prayer in the life of even an apostle?

GO DEEPER | DIVINE ACTION THROUGH ORDINARY PRESENCE

The sentence is deliberately ordinary: Titus arrived, and Paul says God comforted them. Scripture can attribute comfort to God while also naming the human means through which that comfort came. This prevents a false choice between 'God helped me' and 'people helped me.' The people of God can be one of the ways God's help becomes tangible.

BRING IT BEFORE GOD (PERSONAL REFLECTION & APPLICATION)

5. Where do you tend to withdraw into isolation when you are hurting? What makes receiving help difficult?

6. Who in your life might need you to arrive, remain, pray, listen, or help rather than explain?

PRACTICE THIS CONCRETELY: Choose one concrete act of presence for a hurting person this week. Keep it simple enough that the goal is faithful presence, not fixing the entire situation.

PRAYER RESPONSE: Thank God for people through whom His comfort has reached you. Ask for humility to receive help and attentiveness to become a faithful presence for someone else. Write your prayer below.

UNIT 03 | STUDY 09: RECEIVE BEFORE YOU CARRY

Recognize the season you are in and give up the pressure to perform.

READ THE TEXT: (2 Corinthians 1:3–7; 2 Corinthians 7:5–7) Read the passage from your Bible before continuing. Mark repeated words, commands, promises, descriptions of God, and statements of allegiance.

SUMMARY

Paul establishes an order: we are comforted by God, and then we are able to comfort others. Some believers are currently in a season where their primary calling is to receive: to accept prayer, meals, presence, treatment, rest, and truth without feeling forced to manufacture a quick testimony or turn their open wound into an immediate ministry. Receiving comfort without shame is itself an act of faith.

KEY THOUGHT

You don't owe everyone a ministry while your wound is still open. Receive before you carry.

START WITH THE TEXT (OBSERVATION & TEXTUAL FOCUS)

1. According to 2 Corinthians 1:3–4, what is the sequence between receiving God's comfort and comforting others?

2. Why is receiving comfort a necessary prerequisite before carrying comfort to others?

GO DEEPER | YOUR STORY isn't THEIR TEMPLATE

Christian comfort is strongest when it remains rooted in God's mercy and Scripture rather than converting personal experience into a universal promise.

Integrating Endurance, Dependence, Comfort, and Resurrection Hope

1. TRACE THE PATH OF ENDURANCE

Movement	Theological Description
Pressure	Suffering and testing expose the limits of control and the assumptions beneath our faith.
Grief	Scripture gives room to lament honestly without treating grief as unbelief.
Allegiance	Endurance means continuing to belong to Jesus when faithfulness is costly.
Entrust	The final outcome is placed in the hands of the faithful Creator while obedience continues.
Wisdom	Mature faith asks God for what it lacks rather than pretending to possess every answer.
Dependence	Being beyond our strength redirects trust toward the God who raises the dead.
Provision	God may provide rest, food, changed pace, companionship, prayer, counsel, or a different assignment.
Comfort	The Father of mercies comforts His people and may make that comfort tangible through others.
Resurrection	The final horizon isn't merely coping. The risen Christ guarantees that suffering and death are not ultimate.

2. THREE HORIZONS OF DELIVERANCE

Horizon	Biblical Meaning & Scope
FROM SUFFERING	God changes the circumstance: the danger passes, the door opens, the body heals, or rescue comes in the way we hoped. Scripture includes genuine stories of this deliverance. (Heb 11:32–35a; 2 Cor 1:10)
THROUGH SUFFERING	God sustains allegiance inside lingering trial: faith perseveres, wisdom is given, provision arrives, and endurance forms maturity while trial remains. (1 Pet 4:19; James 1:2–12; 1 Kings 19)
BEYOND SUFFERING	Resurrection secures ultimate future beyond death: even if earthly relief doesn't come, death itself is defeated by the risen Christ. (1 Pet 1:3–5; 2 Cor 1:9; Heb 11:35b–40)

REFLECT: How does holding all three horizons together protect you from both disillusionment (if relief is delayed) and despair (if death interrupts)?

5. A PRAYER OF DEPENDENCE AND HOPE

PRAISE: Name what is true about God as faithful Creator, Father of mercies, God of all comfort, and the One who raises the dead.

LAMENT: Tell the truth about what hurts, what remains, and what you wish God would change.

ENTRUST: Place the outcome you can't control into the care of the faithful Creator.

ASK: Ask for wisdom, provision, courage, prayer, and the next faithful step.

RECEIVE: Thank God for the help He is giving through Scripture, the Spirit, treatment, counsel, rest, prayer, or people.

CARRY: Ask whether there is someone you can serve with patient truth, mercy, prayer, presence, or hope.

HOPE: Express your confidence in the resurrection of Jesus and the future in which suffering and death lose the final word.

6. EXTENDED LEARNING: FURTHER STUDY PATHS

- **1 Peter 1–4 | Suffering, Allegiance, and Glory:** Trace every reference to suffering, hope, glory, the name of Christ, judgment, doing good, and entrusting. Ask how the resurrection shapes each one.
- **Romans 8:18–39 | Groaning, Weakness, and Future Glory:** Follow the movement from creation's groaning to the Spirit's help, God's purpose, and the assurance that nothing can separate believers from God's love.
- **Hebrews 11–12 | Faith With Different Earthly Outcomes:** Compare deliverances and deaths in Hebrews 11, then read Hebrews 12:1–3 to see how Jesus becomes the controlling focus for endurance.
- **James 1 | Testing, Wisdom, Endurance, and Life:** Track the logic of testing, endurance, wisdom, instability, wealth, perseverance, and the crown of life.
- **2 Corinthians 1 & 7 | Comfort, Dependence, Prayer, and Community:** Mark every use of comfort, affliction, help, prayer, fear, arrival, and thanksgiving. Observe how divine action and human participation are held together.
