# **The Gospels - John**

## I. Written By: John

- a. "The One Jesus Loved" never uses his own name throughout his gospel (Other disciple)
- b. One of the twelve apostles, one of the three closest to Jesus (Peter, James, John)
- c. One of the "Sons of Zebedee" Mother was Salome (Matthew 4:21) James
- d. Fisherman by trade
- e. Some scholars believe that he was one of the followers of John The Baptist (John 1:35-40)
- f. One of the first disciples to believe in Jesus' resurrection (John 20:1-8)
- g. Feud with Peter Outran Peter (John 20:1-4) Peter asks what happens to John (John 21: 21-22)
- h. Possibly the youngest disciple (beloved often used for young individuals, projected dates of writings)
- i. The one Jesus commits His mother (John 19:25-27)
- j. Stayed active as a church leader (Acts 3:1; 4:13; 8:14; 15:2, 22-23)
- k. Escaped Neronian persecution of late 60's -70's
- I. Banished to Patmos by Roman Emperor Domitian (Rev 1:9)
- m. Author of four other books in New Testament (1-3 John, Revelation)

#### II. Evidence for Johannine Authorship

- a. Author was Jewish due to the understanding of word, symbols, customs, and OT knowledge.
- b. Eyewitness accounts of persons, time, numbers, places, manners, and other details.
- c. Process of elimination (Peter, Thomas, Philip, Andrew, all mentioned by name, James died in AD 44)
- d. Early fragments of John confirm first century authorship
- e. Early testimony of Irenaeus, disciple of Polycarp disciple of John
- f. Early sources confirm authorship (Clement of Alexandria, Tertullian, and Eusebius)
- g. Wasn't disputed until the second century with the Alogoi sect (denied deity of Christ and the Holy Spirit)

#### III. Date of Writing

- a. Written between AD 90-98
- b. Well after the fall of the temple to Nero in AD 70 (no mention)
- c. Well before Irenaeus (cites the work in the early second century)
- d. One of the earliest fragments (John Ryland Fragment) was found in Egypt and dated to AD 117 138
- e. Must have been written before the death of John (AD 98 according to Irenaeus)
  - i. During reign of Domitian (AD 81-96)

#### IV. Audience

- a. Christians in Asia Minor
- b. Probably centered around Ephesus (Modern day Turkey)

## V. Intent/Emphasis

- a. Show Christ as the Messiah, the Son of God, Fully God, Fully Man,
  - i. More than the "activity" of Christ, John is focused on the "identity" of Christ.
  - ii. Specific emphasis on the Deity of Christ.
  - iii. Shows more of the humanity of Jesus
    - 1. Tired (4:6)
    - 2. Wept (11:35)
    - 3. Thirsty (19:28)
    - 4. Suffered (19:18
    - 5. Died (19:30)
- b. "That you may continue to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that by believing in Him you will have life by the power of His name" John 20:30-31
- c. Supplement and provide additional biographical information
  - i. There is debate whether John had the other three Gospels at the time of his writing.
  - ii. Confirmed by Eusebius, Papias, Clement, Iranaius, Jerome, Gregory of Nasianzus, and St Augustine of Hippo
  - iii. Over 90% unique from the other Gospels
- d. One-Third of John's Gospel is centered around the last eight days of Christ's ministry and life.
- e. Emphasis can be found in the repetition of certain words
  - i. Jesus and Christ are used about 170 times
  - ii. Believe about 100 times, behold about 60 times
  - iii. Know over 135 times
