



“Your Will Be Done”

February 1, 2026

1. Over the past several weeks, we’ve read, recited, and explored [Matthew 6:9-13](#) while hearing sermons about the power and purpose of prayer.

- How have these verses impacted the way you approach and understand prayer?
- In what ways has your approach to prayer changed—or remained the same— since studying the Lord’s prayer?
- When you pray “Your will be done”, what thoughts or emotions come to mind?

2. Pastor Troy taught about two different “wills at work in our lives”:

- God’s will— sovereign, moral & permissive, and
- Our will (the flesh)— driven by emotion, imagination, and self-desire. Will was described as greater than a want— it’s a determination of how things *will* go.
- What stands out to you about the differences between God’s will and our will, and where do you find yourself wrestling between the two?
- Can you share a time when you honored either your will or God’s will and what you learned from it?

3. Read, reflect, and discuss the following passages: [2 Peter 3:9](#), [Micah 6:8](#), [Ephesians 1:9](#)

What do these verses reveal about God’s heart and His will for humanity? How do they encourage you to trust His will is good, even when circumstances are uncertain? How can knowing the character of God bring peace when your will conflicts with His?

4. This week, consider how you can actively grow and align with God’s will by:

- a. Delighting in His presence (spending intentional time with Him)
- b. Delighting in His word (listening and responding to scripture)
- c. Delighting in His work (joining in what God is doing around you)

Share what you plan to do this week.
