Bible Lesson: God's Love for Us – Old Testament, New Testament, and Jesus' Teachings

Introduction: God's love is the central theme throughout the Bible, from the Old Testament to the New Testament, culminating in the life and teachings of Jesus Christ. His love is steadfast, sacrificial, and unconditional, shaping the way we are to live and respond to Him. This lesson will explore how God's love is expressed across Scripture and provide practical ways to engage and experience that love in our daily lives. 1. God's Love in the Old Testament

- Scripture Reference: **Exodus 34:6-7 (NIV):** "And he passed in front of Moses, proclaiming, 'The Lord, the Lord, the compassionate and gracious God, slow to anger, abounding in love and faithfulness, maintaining love to thousands, and forgiving wickedness, rebellion, and sin.'"
- Key Point: God reveals Himself to Moses as abounding in love and compassion. The Old Testament consistently portrays God's love as part of His very character—steadfast and faithful even when humanity falters.
- Scripture Reference: **Deuteronomy 7:9 (NIV):** "Know therefore that the Lord your God is God; he is the faithful God, keeping his covenant of love to a thousand generations of those who love him and keep his commandments."
- Key Point: God's love is expressed through His covenant relationship with Israel. His love is both protective and nurturing, ensuring that His promises stand firm.
- Illustration: God's love in the Old Testament is like a father's care for his children. Though Israel repeatedly strayed, God's love remained constant, guiding and protecting His people despite their failings.

2. God's Love in the New Testament

- Scripture Reference: **Romans 5:8 (NIV):** "But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us."
- Key Point: The New Testament brings God's love into even sharper focus. In Christ's sacrificial death, God's love is made manifest in its ultimate form. This love is not based on merit but freely given, even while we were still in sin.
- Scripture Reference: **1 John 4:9-10 (NIV):** "This is how God showed his love among us: He sent his one and only Son into the world that we might live through him. This is

love: not that we loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins."

- Key Point: God's love is proactive—He initiates the relationship by sending Jesus to atone for our sins. The New Testament emphasizes that God's love is foundational to the new life we have in Christ.
- Illustration: God's love through Christ is like a shepherd who leaves the ninety-nine sheep to seek and save the one that is lost (Luke 15:4). He relentlessly pursues us out of love, bringing us back into His fold.

3. God's Love in the Teachings of Jesus

- Scripture Reference: John 15:12-13 (NIV):"My command is this: Love each other as I have loved you. Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends."
- Key Point: Jesus' teachings reveal a love that is both sacrificial and selfless. He not only commands love but demonstrates it through His life and ultimately His death. Jesus' love sets the standard for how we are to love one another.
- Scripture Reference: Matthew 22:37-39 (NIV):"Jesus replied: 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: Love your neighbor as yourself.'"
- Key Point: Jesus taught that love for God and love for others is the essence of all the commandments. These two commandments summarize the entire will of God and should shape our lives.
- Illustration: Jesus' love is like a vine and branches (John 15:1-8). As we stay connected to Him, we experience His love flowing through us, allowing us to bear fruit that reflects His character.

4. Practical Ways to Engage and Experience God's Love:

- Reflect on Scripture Daily:
 - Engage with verses that remind you of God's love, such as Psalm 136:1 ("Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good. His love endures forever.") or Romans 8:38-39 ("Nothing can separate us from the love of God").
 - Meditating on God's Word helps us internalize His love and keeps it at the forefront of our hearts.
- Embrace the Sacrificial Nature of God's Love:
 - Look for ways to love sacrificially, as Jesus did. Whether through acts of service, forgiveness, or giving, modeling Christ's love in action helps us understand His heart.

- Practice Loving Others:
- Love those around you actively, even when it is difficult. Engage in acts of kindness and compassion, knowing that God's love for you empowers you to love others unconditionally.
- Spend Time in Prayer:
 - Communicate with God regularly, asking Him to reveal more of His love to you. Use passages like Ephesians 3:14-19 to pray for a deeper understanding of God's immense love.
- Seek God in Worship:
 - Experience God's love through worship—both corporate and personal. Whether singing, meditating, or giving thanks, worship connects us to God's loving presence in a special way.
