"From the start, Greeks and Latins had approached the Christian Mystery in their own way. The Latin approach was more practical; the Greek more speculative; Latin thought was influenced by more juridical ideas, by the concepts of Roman law, while the Greeks understood theology in the context of worship and in the light of the Holy Liturgy. ... When thinking about the Crucifixion, Latins thought primarily of Christ the Victim, Greeks of Christ the Victor; Latins talked more of redemption, Greeks of deification ... these two distinctive approaches were not in themselves contradictory; each served to supplement the other, and each had its place in the fullness of the Catholic tradition. But now that the two sides were becoming strangers to one another – with no political and little cultural unity, with no common language – there was a danger that each side would follow its own approach in isolation and push it to extremes, forgetting the value in the opposite point of view."


