HOW TO READ A GOD'S BOOK:

- 1. OBSERVATION
 - Ask Questions (who, what, when, where, how, and why)
 - Look for Emphasis (person, principle, practice, or place)
 - Look for Repetition (nouns, verbs, phrases, etc.,)
- 2. INTERPRETATION
 - Context, Context, Context
 - Use a 1st Century Lens vs. 21st Century Lens
- 3. APPLICATION
 - Look for Commands Apply Immediately
