Faith, Restoration & the God of the Impossible

Main Topic: Faith and the Power of God

- Discussed the biblical story where Jesus' disciples could not cast out a demon and questioned why; Jesus responded it was due to their unbelief and emphasized that even faith as small as a mustard seed can move mountains.
- Stressed that believers are called not to the possible, but to the impossible, relying on God's power, not their own abilities.
- Multiple scriptures cited (e.g., 1 Corinthians 10:31, Matthew 5:16, Ephesians 2:10, Luke 1:37, Matthew 19:26, Jeremiah 32:17) to reinforce the message that with God, nothing is impossible and our actions should glorify Him.
- Emphasis on the necessity of faith for spiritual breakthroughs, healing, and ministry effectiveness.

Key Points

- Believers often revert to doing only what is possible and within their own strength, but God calls them to tasks that are impossible without Him.
- Personal and church ministries may have been "put on the shelf" (neglected or set aside), especially following challenging periods

like COVID.

- Restoration and revival are possible, even for what seems dead or hopeless (marriage, finances, health, ministries).

Questions Raised

- Why do we struggle with unbelief even after witnessing God's power?
- What areas of our lives or ministries have we neglected that God wants to revive?

Decisions & Action Plans

- Call to take neglected ministries and spiritual practices "off the shelf" and trust God for revival and the impossible.
- Encouragement to renew faith, prayer, and spiritual disciplines, especially corporate and personal prayer.
- Invitation for personal reflection, repentance, and seeking spiritual renewal at the altar.
- Call for elders and prayer warriors to actively pray for those seeking restoration, healing, or salvation.

Additional Topic: Ezekiel's Vision of Dry Bones (Ezekiel 37)

- Detailed recounting of Ezekiel's vision, emphasizing how God can bring life to dry, scattered bones—interpreted as a metaphor for spiritual renewal and restoration in the church and in individuals' lives.
- Applied to modern challenges: post-COVID spiritual fatigue, division, and loss of fervor.
- Message: No matter how dire the situation may seem, God can breathe new life and bring unity and restoration.

Additional Reflections & Applications

- Comparison to other biblical stories (David recovering all, Moses at the Red Sea, Joshua at Jericho, David and Goliath, Jesus' resurrection) to illustrate that God repeatedly does the impossible.
- Contemporary application: The church must not settle for the possible but actively expect and pursue the miraculous through faith.
- Encouragement for those feeling spiritually dry, broken, or in hopeless situations to seek God for renewal, healing, and restoration.

Closing & Call to Action

- Strong altar call for repentance, salvation, healing, and spiritual renewal.
- Prayer for the Holy Spirit to breathe new life into all present and for restoration in every area that feels "dead."
