Norman Silber '78 Ph.D.

Guido Calabresi: An Egalitarian Believer's First Amendment

Norman I. Silber is a professor of law and the Associate Dean for Intellectual Life at the Maurice A. Deane School of Law, Hofstra University. He holds an undergraduate degree from Washington University, a J.D. from Columbia University, and a Ph.D. in history from Yale University. Professor Silber teaches and writes in areas that relate to consumer law, commercial law, legal history, and nonprofit corporations. He joined the Hofstra law faculty after practicing with the New York City law firm of Patterson, Belknap, Webb & Tyler. He is an interviewer for the Columbia University Oral History Research Office. His most recent work includes Outside In: The Oral History of Guido Calabresi (Oxford University Press 2023), a two-volume work, chronicling the life of Guido Calabresi.

Being a Person of Faith Today: Insights from the US Bishops' document "Encountering Christ in Harmony"

Dr. Jem Sullivan is Associate Professor of Practice in Catechetics in the School of Theology and Religious Studies at The Catholic University of America, Washington, D.C. She teaches under-graduate and graduate courses in the history and theory of Catechetics. She has a M.A. in Theology from Ateneo University and a Ph.D. in Religious Education from The Catholic University of America. Her research and publications focus on liturgical catechesis and the place of beauty and the arts in catechesis and evangelization. Dr. Sullivan is the author of four books, her latest titled Believe, Celebrate, Live, Pray: A Weekly Walk with the Catechism of the Catholic Church (Our Sunday Visitor Press, 2020). She is also the host of a podcast "Echoing Faith Today."

A Hunger for Justice

Dr. Carolyn Woo is the former President and CEO of Catholic Relief Services (CRS). She was born and raised in Hong Kong and immigrated to the United States to attend Purdue University where she received her bachelor's, master's and doctorate degrees. Currently Dr. Woo serves on the corporate boards of AON (UK), Arabesque (Germany) and on the International Advisory Group of Equinor (Norway). In 2013, Dr. Woo was cited by Foreign Policy as one of the Five Hundred Most Powerful People on the Planet and one of only thirty-three in the category "A Force for Good." She was one of five presenters in Rome at the release of Pope Francis' encyclical on the environment in June 2015. Catholic Women Preach: Raising Voices, Renewing the Church

Elizabeth A. Donnelly is the Co-Founder of and Preacher Coordinator for the website Catholic Women Preach and co-editor of *Catholic Women Preach: Raising Voices, Renewing the Church, Cycle A.* She earned a Master of Theological Studies in Christian Social Ethics from Harvard Divinity School and conducted doctoral research at Harvard in the field of international political economy and ethics, writing extensively on the Catholic Church's contribution to the movement for debt relief for heavily indebted low-income countries. Elizabeth is a member of a group of female foundation leaders who have engaged in dialogue with top Vatican officials on the role of women in the Church and is a frequent speaker and writer on Catholic affairs.

Father Edward Foley is a Catholic priest, educator, preacher, theologian and author, and a member of the Capuchin Franciscan Order. He received two master's degrees and a Ph.D. from Notre Dame University. He is the Duns Scotus Professor Emeritus of Spirituality and Professor of Liturgy and Music at Catholic Theological Union, where he was the founding director of the Ecumenical Doctor of Ministry Program. An award-winning author and celebrated preacher, he has been honored with lifetime achievement awards from national and international organizations and is a recent recipient of a major grant for preaching from the John Templeton Foundation. His most recent book is Eucharistic Adoration after Vatican II (Liturgical Press, 2022).



Eucharist and World Hunger: Mary, Breast Milk, Synodality, and Lo Cotidiano

Neomi De Anda, is a tenured Associate Professor in the University of Dayton Department of Religious Studies. She earned M.A. in Theology from the Oblate School of Theology and a M.A. in Educational Leadership from St. Mary's University, San Antonio. She also earned a Ph.D. in Constructive Theology from Loyola University, Chicago. Dr. De Anda's intersectional scholarly research focuses on Latinx Christology; theology and breast milk; chisme; the intersection of race and migrations in conjunction with the Marianist Social Justice Collaborative Immigrant Justice Team; and a border theology at the intersections of the environment, migrations, labor and women. She has served as "Scholar in Residence" for the North American Center for Marianist Life (NACMS).
