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Selah Sunday Questions

- **Question 1:** How can we know if there's a lie of the enemy that we've agreed with in our subconscious, if it's not something that has been brought to our attention? AKA "weed prevention"?
- **Question 2:** What are some ways that we can lovingly yet truthfully bring accountability up to other believers when we are led to do so?
- **Question 3:** How do you deal with those who are not on the same spiritual sensitivity as you—who don't believe you? Like the anecdotes in your sermon, have you ever held back from sharing feelings if people would think you're crazy? What about people who are very close to you and they think you're just hallucinating? Have you ever been in a situation where your children have told you things that your skeptical mind wouldn't believe—but your spiritual mind felt it could've been God? Beautifully felt sermon and I thank you for sharing....

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- **Question 4:** How do you keep from slipping into condemnation when doing the dirty work and uncovering things that need correction?
- **Question 5:** How does Matt 18:22, Matt 18:32-35, Matt 5:39 figure into doing the dirty work of healing which may lead you to cut off ties with a friend which might be the best path to healing (or is that really the trauma leading)but feels like the exact opposite of what God tells us in these verses to do. Doesn't forgiveness mean keeping the friendship? Extending grace every time? Healing from the past becomes difficult and it continues to leak into the present.
- **Question 6:** I believe most people don't know how much they are loved by God and because of this they don't believe He speaks to them. They believe they aren't holy enough or whatever. Because of this limited belief they don't seek Him out for intimacy which makes them stay in a passive, lukewarm state. My question would be how would these people come to understand the width, depth and breadth of His love?
