Praising God for His Providence

Introduction

We Must Learn to Glorify God in Every Situation

As we've endured difficulties ... and as we anticipate more uncertainty and disappointment in the upcoming years, we must remember God will be working for us ... demonstrating His providence ... as He always has. In the meantime, we need to remember:

- We are *more than conquerors*, Romans 8.37-39.
- We are striving to be like Jesus who said, *Be courageous! I have conquered the world*, John 16.33b.
- We are overcomers, 1 John 5.4-5.
- Every good and perfect gift comes from God, James 1.17-19.

When we put these things into our mind and allow them to govern our emotions and feelings, we will begin to glorify God in every situation. The Psalmist said:

Blessed be the LORD God, the God of Israel, who alone does wonders. Blessed be his glorious name forever; the whole earth is filled with his glory. Amen and amen.

For Personal Application
