LESSON 5

The Kingdom of God in Human History: The Law of Moses

Psalm 103:19

The Lord has established his throne in heaven, and his kingdom rules over all, Psalm 103:19.

Class Overview: This lesson explores God's kingship during the period of the Law of Moses, showing that His rule was not limited to Israel but extended over all creation. From the promises made to Abraham to the giving of the Law at Sinai, God established a covenant people to display His holiness, justice, and mercy to the world. Through priests, prophets, and judges, He guided His people and revealed His will. Yet, even beyond Israel, God ruled the hearts of those who sought Him in faith—like the people of Nineveh, Naaman, and Nebuchadnezzar—demonstrating that His sovereignty and righteousness transcend all boundaries. This study reminds us that the Lord has always been King, and that all who walk by faith are His servants and citizens in His eternal Kingdom.

Class Objectives:

By the end of this class, you should be able to:

- 1. Understand that God's kingship is eternal and was present long before the giving of the Law of Moses.
- 2. Explain how the Law of Moses functioned as God's governing system for His covenant people, Israel.
- 3. Recognize how God communicated His will through priests, prophets, and judges.
- 4. Identify examples of non-Israelites in the Old Testament who honored God as King and what their stories teach us.
- 5. Appreciate how God's universal kingship prepares the way for the revelation of His Kingdom through Jesus Christ.

Introduction

In the previous lesson, we established that God (Deity) had been King before the world was, as He created the heavens and the earth; He was King during the entire time before the Law of Moses. The fact that some may not recognize that God is King has nothing to do with the eternal fact that He is. We must understand the completeness of God's reign over all things seen and unseen before we will submit in reverence to his wonderful will for us. In this lesson, we will discuss the Kingship of God over the world during the time of the Law, which was given to Israel.
