- I. Paul's Introduction to the Philippians (1)
 - A. Paul lived humbly (1a) "Paul and Timothy, <u>servants of Christ Jesus</u>..."

 Though he was a mighty Apostle, he remained a servant.
 - B. Paul loved liberally (1b) "...<u>to all the saints in Christ Jesus</u> who are at Philippi..."

 Mature & immature. Easy going & difficult. Wise & not-yet wise. Young & old.
 - C. Paul led strategically (1c) "...with the <u>overseers and deacons</u>."

 Paul saw to it that every church he planted was organized with approved, qualified leadership and ministry teams
- II. Paul's Benediction over the Philippians (2)
 - A. The people could exhale (2a) "Grace to you..."
 - B. The people could rejoice (2b) "...and peace from God our Father..."
 - C. The people could hope (2c) "...and the Lord Jesus Christ."
- III. Paul's Affirmation of the Philippians (3-6)
 - A. As a spiritual father, Paul treasured the people (3) "I thank my God in all my remembrance of you..."

 They lived lives that provoked Paul to gratitude. It was a 2-way street of valuing one another.
 - B. As a shepherd, Paul prayed for the people (4) "...<u>always in every prayer of mine for you all</u> making my prayer with joy..."
 - C. As a leader, Paul appreciated the people (5) "...because of <u>your partnership in the gospel</u> from the first day until now."
 - D. As a prophet, Paul built up the people (6) "And I am sure of this, that He who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ."
 - <u>1 Corinthians 14:1-4</u> "Pursue love, and earnestly desire the spiritual gifts, especially that you may prophesy. 2 For one who speaks in a tongue speaks not to men but to God; for no one understands him, but he utters mysteries in the Spirit. 3 On the other hand, the one who prophesies speaks to people for their upbuilding and encouragement and consolation. 4 The one who speaks in a tongue builds up himself, but the one who prophesies builds up the church."
