I. The Threshold Of Surrendered Desire (1-5a)

A. The strong desire for God's presence (1) - "Oh that You would rend the heavens and come down, that the mountains might quake at Your presence..."

B. The jealous desire for God's name (2) - "...as when fire kindles brushwood and the fire causes water to boil - to make Your name known to Your adversaries, and that the nations might tremble at Your presence!"

C. The penetrating desire for God's power (3-4) - "When You did awesome things that we did not look for, You came down, the mountains quaked at your presence. 4 From of old no one has heard or perceived by the ear, no eye has seen a God besides You, who acts for those who wait for Him."

D. The relational desire for God's affirmation (5a) - "You meet him who joyfully works righteousness, those who remember You in Your ways.

II. The Threshold Of Surrendered Confession (5b-7) {no hedging, full/honest confession}

A. We have nothing with which to bargain (5b) - "Behold, You were angry, and we sinned; in our sins we have been a long time, and shall we be saved?"

B. We cannot cover our obvious stains (6) - "We have <u>all</u> become <u>like one who is unclean</u>, and <u>all our righteous deeds are like a polluted garment</u>. We all fade like a leaf, and <u>our iniquities, like the wind, take us away</u>."

C. We are guilty of being indifferent (7a) - "There is no one who calls upon Your name, who rouses himself to take hold of You;

D. We cannot bear to go on apart from you (7b) - "...for You have hidden Your face from us, and have made us melt in the hand of our iniquities."

III. The Threshold Of Surrendered Pathways (8-12)

A. We trust His moving hand (8) - "But now, O Lord, You are our Father; we are the clay, and You are our potter; we are all the work of Your hand."

B. We stand in His unbreakable covenant (9) - "Be not so terribly angry, O Lord, and remember not iniquity forever. Behold, <u>please look, we are all</u> Your people."

C. We mourn the fallout from our failures (10-11) - "Your holy cities have become a <u>wilderness;</u> Zion has become a <u>wilderness</u>, Jerusalem a <u>desolation</u>. 11 Our holy and beautiful house, where our fathers praised You, has been <u>burned by fire</u>, and all our pleasant places have become <u>ruins</u>."

D. We surrender in hope of reversal (12) - "Will You restrain Yourself at these things, O Lord? Will You keep silent, and afflict us so terribly?"

Isaiah expressed a confidence in God's mercy and kindness, even while acknowledging that Israel deserved nothing from God. From this we learn that we must yield ourselves fully to the unchanging character of a good and holy God, who is also the unwaveringly compassionate Father.
