I. What the Psalmist Was Sensing (1-8)

A. The absence of presence (1) - "O God, why do You cast us off forever? Why does Your anger smoke against the sheep of your pasture?"

B. The absence of promise (2) - "Remember <u>Your congregation</u>, <u>which You have purchased of old</u>, <u>which You have</u> <u>redeemed to be the tribe of Your heritage</u>! Remember Mount Zion, where You have dwelt."

C. The absence of honor (3-8) - "Direct Your steps to the perpetual ruins; <u>the enemy has destroyed everything in the</u> <u>sanctuary</u>! 4 <u>Your foes have roared in the midst of Your meeting place</u>; they set up their own signs for signs. 5 They were like those who swing axes in a forest of trees. 6 And all its carved wood they broke down with hatchets and hammers. 7 <u>They set Your sanctuary on fire</u>; they profaned the dwelling place of Your name, bringing it down to the ground. 8 They said to themselves, "We will utterly subdue them"; <u>they burned all the meeting places of God in the land</u>."

II. What the Psalmist Was Asking (9-11)

A. Where are the voices of the prophets? (9) - "<u>We do not see our signs;</u> there is no longer any prophet, and there is none among us who knows how long."

B. Where is the refuting of the lies? (10) - "How long, O God, is the foe to scoff? Is the enemy to revile Your name forever?"

C. Where is the vindication of your glory? (11) - "<u>Why do You hold back Your hand</u>, Your right hand? Take it from the fold of Your garment and <u>destroy them</u>!"

III. What the Psalmist Was Declaring (13-17)

A. Who God is (12) - "Yet God my King is from of old, working salvation in the midst of the earth."

B. What God did (13-15) - "You divided the sea by Your might; You broke the heads of the sea monsters on the waters. 14 You crushed the heads of Leviathan; You gave him as food for the creatures of the wilderness. 15 You split open springs and brooks; You dried up ever-flowing streams." Wonder-working power

C. Where God reigns (16-17) - "<u>Yours is the day, Yours also the night</u>; You have established the heavenly lights and the sun. 17 <u>You have fixed all the boundaries of the earth</u>; You have made summer and winter." Comprehensive reign over both time and space

IV. How the Psalmist Fights (18-23)

A. Rooted in the glory of God (18) - "Remember this, O LORD, how the enemy scoffs, and a foolish people reviles Your name."

B. Convinced of the promises of God (19-20) - "Do not deliver the soul of <u>Your dove</u> to the wild beasts; do not forget the life of <u>Your poor</u> forever. 20 <u>Have regard for the covenant</u>, for the dark places of the land are full of the habitations of violence."

C. Appealing to the justice of God (21-23) - "Let not the downtrodden turn back in shame; let the poor and needy praise Your name. 22 Arise, O God, <u>defend Your cause</u>; remember how the foolish scoff at You all the day! 23 Do not forget the clamor of Your foes, <u>the uproar of those who rise against You</u>, which goes up continually!"
