This week our government legalized the recreational use of cannabis. The impact of this decision will surely effect generations to come. As a Christ-follower what should my stance be in relationship to this or any other mind-altering substance, legal or illegal? What wisdom and guidelines do the Scriptures offer? Can a Christ-follower partake on occasion as one would a glass of wine? If it's legal, does that make it moral?

The apostle Paul gave the church in Ephesus some of the most profound principles of Scripture to help them navigate the difficult issues they had to wrestle with in their time. These principles are no less valid today, and will give you the tools to help you make the best decisions for your life.

But isn't Marijuana Healthy Because It's A Natural Plant?

So are hemlock and tobacco. In fact there are over 100 natural plants that will kill you if you inhale or ingest them.

I could tell you the facts:

- It will damage your brain
- Change the way a user's brain works up to age of 25
- Negative impact on memory and attention.
- Shrinks the thalamus, the part of the brain that's involved in consciousness and information processing.
- · Loss of memory, attention, and learning.
- Users have a higher incidence of schizophrenia than non-users, especially if there was a family history.
- It's addictive and a gateway drug
- 9% of people who use marijuana develop an addiction
- 17% in people who begin using in their teens
- A new study of marijuana drug use in Colorado found increases in marijuana-related traffic deaths, hospital visits, school suspensions.

Guardrails: direct and protect

- A system designed to keep vehicles from straying into dangerous or off-limit areas.
- Bridges going off the edge
- Medians protecting you from oncoming traffic, or vice versa
- Curves- changes in the road ahead
- Never placed in the danger zone.
- Takes up some safe place.
- Designed to minimize damage.
