



5-Day Bible Reading Plan and Devotional Guide Based on Romans 9:6-13 and Supporting Themes

Day 1: God Cannot Lie — The Foundation of Everything

****Reading:** Numbers 23:19, John 14:6, John 1:1-5**

****Devotional:****

Every promise God has ever made stands on one unshakeable reality: He cannot lie. His Word is not subject to circumstance, popular opinion, or the passage of time. Jesus is not merely a path to truth — He is truth itself, the living Word present at creation. When life feels uncertain or confusing, the Christian does not search for a new foundation. He returns to the one that never shifts. Ask yourself today: Do I truly believe God is incapable of deception? If so, does the way I live reflect that confidence? Truth believed changes behavior.

Physical lineage never saved anyone. Religious routine never saved anyone. Works, sacrifices, and church attendance never saved anyone. Salvation belongs exclusively to the children of promise — those who, by faith, are grafted into the line that runs from Abraham through Isaac, through David, and ultimately to Jesus Christ. The Israelites who trusted in their bloodline missed the very God their bloodline was meant to point to. Many church-goers today make the same mistake. Examine your heart honestly: Is your confidence in what you do for God, or in what God has done for you through Christ?

After David's devastating sin with Bathsheba, he did not run to the altar with more sacrifices. He ran to God with a shattered heart. He understood something that works-based religion never grasps — God is not impressed by religious output. He is drawn to brokenness. Contrite in the Hebrew carries the image of collapsing, of a person who has nothing left to offer but themselves. No amount of sacrifice, service, or spiritual discipline substitutes for genuine surrender. God does not want your performance. He wants you. Come to Him today not with a list of accomplishments, but with an open and honest heart.

The Israelites did not abandon God by worshipping obvious idols alone. Many of them made the law itself an idol. They made sacrifice an idol. They made genealogy an idol. Good things, even God-ordained things, can become substitutes for God when they are pursued for their own sake rather than as expressions of love for Him. Christians are equally vulnerable. Church attendance, Bible reading, and service are beautiful responses to salvation — but the moment they become the basis for standing before God, they have become idols. Ask yourself today: Am I doing these things because I have Jesus, or am I doing them to get something from Him?

Before Jacob and Esau had done anything good or evil, God had already chosen according to His purpose. This is not a passage designed to produce anxiety — it is a passage designed to produce rest. Salvation was never about what you could produce. It was always about what God, in His sovereign grace, determined to do. That same grace that saved you sustains you. You cannot earn your way in, and you cannot fail your way out. Freedom in Christ means you serve, worship, study, and love not to secure your standing, but because your standing is already secure in Him. Live today from that freedom.
