



5-Day Bible Reading Plan and Devotional Guide

Based on Romans 9:14 and the Righteousness of God

Day 1: There Is No Unrighteousness in God

****Reading:** Romans 9:14; Psalm 92:15**

****Devotional:****

It is one thing to say God is good. It is another thing entirely to live as though you believe it. Romans 9:14 declares that there is no unrighteousness in God, and Psalm 92:15 confirms that He is straight, without evil or perverseness. This is not merely a theological statement to be agreed with in your head. It is a foundation to be stood upon with your whole life. When circumstances feel unjust, when prayers seem unanswered, when life feels crooked, the character of God has not changed. He remains entirely without unrighteousness. Ask yourself today: does your daily life reflect a genuine belief in who God actually is, or a softened version you have constructed for your own comfort?

Day 2: God Is Holy, Therefore Obedience Is Required

****Reading:**** Deuteronomy 32:4; John 14:15

****Devotional:****

Deuteronomy 32:4 describes God as complete, entire, full of truth, judicially just, and without wickedness or unrighteousness. Because this is who God is, holiness is not optional for the believer. Salvation is the beginning of the journey, not the destination. Sanctification is not a polite request from God but a demand rooted in His very nature. A gospel that tells you God loves you and therefore you may live however you choose is not the gospel of Scripture. It is a comfortable lie. God loves you enough to call you upward, not leave you where He found you. Where in your life are you accepting unrighteousness that God is calling you to surrender?

Day 3: God Is Your Refuge

****Reading:**** 2 Samuel 22:1-4; Psalm 46:1-3

****Devotional:****

In the ancient world, a city of refuge meant absolute protection. If you were inside its walls, no enemy could lawfully touch you. God Himself is that refuge for His people. When life overwhelms you, the first instinct of the flesh is to run toward something you can control: your own reasoning, other people's opinions, social media, worry, or pride. All of those fail. They have always failed. They will always fail. God is described as a cliff, a high tower, a shield whose protection is as impenetrable as the hide of a crocodile. He is not a passive refuge. He is actively defending you. Today, identify what you run to first when trouble comes, and ask God to become your genuine first refuge.

Day 4: God Sees What No One Else Sees

****Reading:**** 2 Chronicles 19:7; 1 Samuel 16:7

****Devotional:****

Because God is just, He does not evaluate people the way people evaluate people. Human eyes see titles, attendance records, reputations, financial generosity, and outward religious activity. God sees whether the blood of Jesus covers a soul or whether that soul stands exposed before His holiness. This is both a warning and a comfort. It is a warning because no amount of religious performance substitutes for genuine salvation and obedience. It is a comfort because God also sees every quiet act of faithfulness, every private surrender, every unseen moment of obedience. You cannot impress God, but you can walk honestly before Him. Examine your heart today, not your reputation.

Day 5: Living in Light of Who God Is

****Reading:**** Romans 9:14; Deuteronomy 32:4; Psalm 92:15

****Devotional:****

Over these five days, the character of God has come into focus. He is holy, requiring holiness from those He has saved. He is a refuge, actively protecting those who flee to Him. He is just, seeing through every surface and judging with perfect equity. He is upright, living entirely according to His own perfect character. Now the question turns fully toward you. Does your life reflect God Himself, or your own flawed and convenient version of Him? Working out your salvation through obedience is not the means of earning grace. It is the evidence of having received it. Chase sanctification. Be disciplined. Disciple others. Let the righteousness of God be the standard by which you measure everything.
