FIRST WEEK OF ADVENT

FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

"The season of Advent is like springtime in nature, when everything is renewed and so is fresh and healthy. Advent is also meant to do this to us – to refresh us and make us healthy, to be able to receive Jesus in whatever form He may come to us."

God in His goodness is so intentional and attentive to what we need and so it comes as no surprise that at the end of the semester as the days get shorter and darker, He would give us a season of hope and new life. "Surely He didn't choose this time of year to be born simply to give us hope at the end of a semester," you might say. But why not? In each time and in each place, God draws close to man and uses all at His disposal to touch our hearts with his love (CCC 1). So yes, even 2000 years ago, God had you in mind when He sent His son to be born of a virgin in a little town named Bethlehem. He knew how burnt out you would feel, how homesick, how hurt, betrayed or broken your heart would be as you enter into these last few weeks of the year. But while the rest of the world hurries about to "accomplish" Christmas, God the Father utters a simple, quiet, and gentle invitation... "Come and wait with me and see what I have prepared for you. Come and see my greatest gift."

He is not afraid of your mess. In fact, like Mother Teresa said, this season, as we prepare for God to become man, is a time to be renewed. Renewed in hope. Renewed in our identity. Renewed in the promise that no matter how dark our lives and our hearts may feel, God is about to enter into the world in a way that will dispel ALL darkness and despair and fear. Nothing will ever be the same and in that there is great hope.

As you reflect back on the past year and look at the next four weeks until Christmas, what areas of your life need to be renewed? Where do you find yourself short on hope? If you could receive anything from Jesus this Advent, what would it be?

Today, the invitation is to tell Him about the parts of your heart that need to be seen and acknowledged. Start with the things that stirred as you read this reflection and those questions. Pay attention to what you feel and then turn toward Jesus and tell Him about it. Prayer is not complicated - it's

simply telling God what is happening in your heart and waiting for Him to respond. So what do you want Him to know?	

"Do we believe that God's love is infinitely more powerful, his mercy more tender than the evil of sin, than all the hatred, conflicts, and tensions that are dividing the world? Than the most powerful bombs and guns ever made by human hands and minds?"

Ponder and write about some ways you see God's love revealed in your life.

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TUESDAY | WEEK 1

"There is a light in this world, a healing spirit more powerful than any darkness we may encounter. We sometimes lose sight of this force when there is suffering. The pain we witness can be overwhelming. Then suddenly, the Spirit will emerge through the lives of ordinary people who hear a call and answer with extraordinary love."

WEDNESDAY | WEEK 1

"Live life beautifully. You have Jesus with you, and He loves you. If we could only remember that God loves us, and we have an opportunity to love others as He loves us. Not in big things, but in small things with great love, then your country will become a haven of peace and a burning light of love in the world."

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THURSDAY | WEEK 1

"We also quench the thirst of Jesus by adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. I see some of you just flop into the chapel. You are just there, that is all. There is not that zeal to quench his thirst for you by a personal meeting with him face to face. Renew your zeal to quench his thirst."

"We have seen that Jesus is the source of streams of living water (Jer 2:13). We might ask, what is it that allows those living streams to spring up within us? What opens up the well? The answer is faith, a faith that puts us into contact with the mystery of Jesus' thirst in all its manifestations. Without faith, our lives and our service can become a perpetual desert. We may be working hard, but still we feel empty; we are neither satiating the Lord nor being satiated by him. Our personal desert may have its oases now and then, but we rarely make the effort to stop our rush of thought and out fevered activity to take the time to drink slowly, deeply, and fully. It is only this deep exercise of faith that can bring our desert into bloom and open our empty hearts to the fire of the Holy Spirit."

Do you feel like your life is a race, that you never have time to stop and appreciate what's happening in and around you?

Pause and talk to Jesus today. Tell Him how you'd like to live. Tell Him what brings you joy and then ask Him what brings Him joy. Then wait for Him to respond. His voice will likely sound like your own voice in your mind, but pay attention to how it makes you feel. Do you feel peaceful? Loved? A good surprised? Then trust that He is speaking with you and sharing from His heart what brings Him joy.

FRIDAY | WEEK 1

"If you were to die today, what would others say about you? What was in you that was beautiful, that was Christlike, that helped others to pray better? Face yourself, with Jesus at your side, and do not be satisfied with just any answer. Go deep into the question. Examine your life."

With Jesus at your side, reflect on your life this past year. What would others say about the way you lived your life? How do you feel about it?

Be honest with Jesus in telling Him where in life you've let discouragement, doubt, fear, and despair take over. Is there a particular way you desire to grow this next year? Perhaps it's building a habit of daily prayer, listening to more wholesome music, or speaking more charitably about people. Ask Jesus to show you what He's inviting you to and to give you the grace necessary to do it. Then write down what you desire to commit to doing.

SATURDAY | WEEK 1

"Everything starts with prayer. Every good thing we do flows from prayer. Ask God to fill you with His love so you can take His love out into the world and share it with others. We talk about prayer at church, but are we praying? It is easy to talk about the poor, but talking about the poor is not the same as talking to the poor. It is easy to talk about prayer, but talking about prayer is not that same as sitting down in a quiet place and talking to God."

Prayer is conversation with God. God dwells within you and desires to draw near to you at every moment. Set an alarm on your phone for a specific time of day, title the alarm "God, fill me with your life so I can share it with others," and pray aloud that short prayer to yourself. Let Jesus into the busyness of your life by taking some time to pray with the Gospel account of Mary and Martha:

"Now as they went on their way, he entered a certain village, where a woman named Martha welcomed him into her home. She had a sister named Mary, who sat at the Lord's feet and listened to what he was saying. But Martha was distracted by her many tasks; so she came to him and asked, 'Lord, do you not care that my sister has left me to do all the work by myself? Tell her then to help me.' But the Lord answered her, 'Martha, Martha, you are worried and distracted by many things; there is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part, which will not be taken away from her."

Luke 10:38-42

As you read through this passage, ask the Holy Spirit to highlight a word or phrase to focus on. Pay attention to where your heart is drawn or what might be stirring inside of you. Sometime that stirring feels like hope starting to sprout or anxiety coursing through your veins or a flutter of worry or fear. Whatever comes up, talk to Jesus about it - tell Him how you feel and then ask Him what He wants to say to you.

In those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus that all the world should be enrolled. This was the first enrollment, when Quirinius was governor of Syria. And all went to be enrolled, each to his own city. And Joseph also went up from Galilee, from the city of Nazareth to Judea, to the city of David, which is called Bethlehem, because he was of the house and lineage of David, to be enrolled with Mary his betrothed, who was with child. And while they were there, the time came for her to be delivered. And she gave birth to her first-born son and wrapped him in swaddling cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

SECOND WEEK OF ADVENT

SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

"Humility always radiates the glory and greatness of God. How wonderful are the ways of God who used humility, smallness, helplessness, and poverty to prove his love to the world. Do not be afraid to be humble, small, and helpless in order to prove your love for God."

Mother Teresa Her Essential Wisdom, 62

These words are so fitting for the second Sunday of Advent as we long for the coming of our savior as a little child. Mother Teresa says to not be <u>afraid</u> to be humble, small, and helpless, but so often that is precisely the emotion that bubbles to the surface of our hearts when we contemplate those ways of being. Humility, littleness, and need are vulnerable. They are spaces where we lack control and are unable to ensure our own safety and that is often scary. However it is in Jesus that we find true strength. Our pride, strength, and self-reliance are never as helpful as we hope they will be, but rather isolate us from the God who has promised to fight for us.

In imitation of Mother Teresa's example of humility through simplicity and prayer, consider giving up social media this week and committing 20 minutes a day to reading the Bible. Start in chapter 1 of Matthew, Mark, or Luke and as you read, pay attention to how Jesus treats the people around Him. Make a list of qualities He seems to possess. Does He seem like someone you'd like to get to know better? Does He seem like someone you can trust? Does He seem like someone who would protect you in your littleness or weakness?



"If you are humble, nothing will touch you, neither praise nor disgrace, because you know what you are. If you are blamed, you won't be discouraged; if anyone calls you a saint, you won't put yourself on a pedestal."

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FRIDAY | WEEK 2

"If you want to become holy, become poor. Jesus became poor to save us, and if we really want to become poor, like Jesus, then we have to be really poor, spiritually poor."

Do Something Beautiful for God, 86

"Jesus did not have to become poor; it was not pressed upon him. He consciously chose poverty for his mission. Consider how constant was the outer manifestation of his inner poverty: he was born in a stable, he spent thirty years as a humble laborer; during his public ministry he had nowhere to lay his head; he was then taken as a prisoner and nailed to the Cross as a criminal, thirsting, betrayed, and abandoned; he was finally laid to rest in a borrowed tomb. If Jesus chose to be poor in order to express his love and accomplish his mission, is it not clear that we who are to be a sign of Christ, another Christ, need to chose poverty? Achieving the degree of poverty the Lord asks involves a gradual process of inner and outer self-emptying. Interiorly we will need to live in the humility of Jesus, in detaching ourselves from ambition and the desire for possessions, in seeking the lowest places, in habitually putting aside false thirsts for temporal riches of whatever kind."

"I can understand the greatness of God, but I cannot understand His humility. It becomes so clear in Him being in love with each one of us separately and completely. It is as if there is no one but me in the world. He loves me so much. Each one of us can say this with great conviction."

THIRD WEEK OF ADVENT

THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT

"No matter how far you may wander, no matter how often you forget Me, no matter how many crosses you may bear in this life; there is one thing I want you to always remember, one thing that will never change: I THIRST FOR YOU - just as you are. You don't need to change to believe in My love, for it will be your belief in My love that will change you. You forget Me, and yet I am seeking you every moment of the day - standing at the door of your heart, and knocking."

spoken from Jesus to you

Mother Teresa wrote this meditation in a letter as she reflected on the words that Jesus spoke from the cross: "I thirst." As we enter into the third week of Advent, spend some time reflecting on these words. What does it mean that Jesus thirsts for you and your love? Do you believe that you are worthy of that kind of love or that someone could love you that much?

Before he hung on the cross and thought of you as he uttered those words, He was invited by His Father to leave Heaven and come to earth as a helpless human baby. Imagine how humbling that would be. To trade in the glory and might of Heaven for the powerlessness and vulnerability of a human being is an incredible sacrifice and He did that for you. As you pray with this mediation today, rather than picturing Jesus on the cross, picture Him as a little baby crying out to be held. Allow yourself to pick Him up and hold him and soothe Him. Watch as He stops crying and looks up into your eyes with complete trust. He has placed Himself in your power, in your arms, just to win your heart heart over to trust in Him. Will you trust the one who completely trusts you? Will you accept the love of the one who aches to receive your love?

Scan the QR code to read and pray with the rest of the meditation. When a line strikes you, stick with it and allow it wash over your heart. Pay attention to what you feel and then tell Jesus what you are feeling. Don't censor your emotions because you "know" something in your head to be true. Jesus wants to help you move your head knowledge to your heart.

FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Come and see, come and share, come and live with me.' Let us remember who is saying this: not just a man, not even just a notable rabbi, but the Lord of the universe and the King of the angels. He speaks these words to every person he has brought into being: "Come and see what you were made for. Come and know the love of the Father. Come and see where I live.

I Thirst: 40 days with Mother Teresa, 34

Today we start the last leg of this journey to the Nativity and it's good for us to remember Jesus' invitation to us: "Come and see!" No matter how this Advent has been for you, Jesus is calling your name and making that invitation to you. As He prepares to enter into this dark and broken world as a little baby, His mind is on you. His desire is to be welcomed into your heart, to be born this Christmas in whatever place you'll offer Him. That first Christmas, all that was available was a humble stable so you can trust that He will not judge whatever space you have to share with Him.

How do you desire to live these last few days before Advent? Are there any ways you desire to prepare your heart for Jesus' coming? Perhaps you feel the need to clean out the space you're preparing for Him by going to confession. Maybe you want to lay a few more pieces of straw in the manger to cushion His little body by doing acts of service for the people around you. Or maybe you want to commit to spending intentional time with Him over the next few days so that when He is born he finds a home that is light and welcoming and warm. However your heart is being moved, make a plan for how and when you'll do that this this week and keep in mind the little child about to be born as you seek to love more deeply.

In the days leading up to Christmas, how can you grow in holiness? Sit next to a Nativity scene (you can also Google an image) and meditate on the birth of Jesus. Where in your life do you desire renewal/rebirth? He is near!

"Mary showed complete trust in God by agreeing to be used as an instrument in his plan of salvation. She was just a young woman, but she belonged to God and nothing nor anyone could separate her from him."
