Small Group Guide: Ezekiel 24-25 - God's Judgment and Faithfulness



Summary:

In Ezekiel 24-25, we're confronted with the sobering reality of God's judgment and the importance of prioritizing our relationship with Him. The vivid imagery of the boiling pot serves as a stark reminder of how deeply sin can penetrate our lives, becoming so ingrained that only the refining fire of God's judgment can purify us. We're challenged to examine our own hearts: Have we allowed our sins to become so deeply rooted that they've become part of who we are? Are we truly putting God first in our lives, even above our most cherished relationships? This message urges us to reflect on Jesus' words in Matthew 10, reminding us that our love for Him must surpass all other loves. As we witness Ezekiel's heart-wrenching personal loss and obedience, we're called to consider our own willingness to follow God, even in the face of great personal cost. This passage invites us to deepen our commitment to God, trusting in His refining process and ultimate plan for our lives.

Discussion Questions:

- 2. The sermon mentions Jesus' words in Matthew 10:34-39. How do you balance loving family and loving God? What does it mean to put God first in practical terms?
- 3. God judged nations that celebrated Israel's downfall. How might this apply to our attitudes towards other believers or churches facing difficulties?
- 4. The sermon describes Israel as needing purification through fire. In what ways might God use difficult circumstances to purify us today?
- 5. How does the destruction of nations who opposed Israel demonstrate God's faithfulness to His promises?
- 6. What does this passage reveal about the nature of sin and its consequences?

Practical Applications

- 1. Reflect on your priorities this week. Are there areas where you need to put God first?
- 2. Practice empathy towards other believers or churches facing challenges, rather than judgment or schadenfreude.
- 3. Consider areas in your life where you might need "purification." Pray for God's guidance in addressing these issues.
- 4. Study God's promises in scripture and reflect on how He has been faithful in your life.
- 5. Examine your attitudes towards God's discipline. How can you view it as an act of love rather than punishment?

Closing Prayer:

Thank God for His faithfulness, even when executing judgment. Ask for help in prioritizing your relationship with Him and for the strength to face any "purifying fire" in your life.

5-day Bible reading plan and devotional guide



Day 1: God's Purifying Love

Reading: Ezekiel 24:1-14

Devotional: Just as the pot in Ezekiel's vision needed intense heat to remove its impurities, God's love often works in our lives through difficult circumstances. Reflect on times when challenges have deepened your faith. How has God's refining process shaped you? Consider areas in your life that may need purification and surrender them to God's transformative love.

Day 2: Faith Amidst Loss

Reading: Ezekiel 24:15-27

Devotional: Ezekiel's personal tragedy mirrors God's heartbreak over His people's unfaithfulness. Even in profound grief, Ezekiel remained obedient to God's calling. When have you experienced loss or disappointment? How did it affect your faith? Pray for the strength to trust God's purpose, even when His ways seem incomprehensible.

Day 3: God's Sovereignty in Judgment

Reading: Ezekiel 25:1-17

Devotional: God's judgment on the nations surrounding Israel demonstrates His sovereignty over all peoples. While we may not always understand God's actions, we can trust in His justice and mercy. Examine your heart - do you sometimes rejoice at others' misfortunes? Ask God to align your perspective with His and to cultivate compassion for all people.

Day 4: The Cost of Discipleship

Reading: Matthew 10:34-39

Devotional: Jesus' words about loving Him above all else echo the themes in Ezekiel. Following Christ often requires difficult choices and priorities. What in your life competes with your devotion to God? Reflect on the blessings that come from fully surrendering to Christ. How can you demonstrate that God is your highest priority today?

Day 5: Hope in God's Promises

Reading: Jeremiah 29:10-14

Devotional: Despite the judgment proclaimed in Ezekiel, God always provides hope for restoration. Even in exile, God promised to bring His people back and bless them. What situations in your life seem hopeless? Meditate on God's faithfulness throughout history. How can you cultivate hope in God's promises, even when circumstances seem bleak?
