

Small Group Guide: Wisdom from Above



Based on James 3:13-4:6

Opening Prayer

Begin your time together by asking God to give you wisdom from above and hearts that are humble before Him.

Ice Breaker

Share about a time when someone's humble actions spoke louder than their words. What made their humility memorable?

Key Takeaways from the Sermon

1. **True wisdom is demonstrated through humble conduct**, not just knowledge or accomplishments
2. **Earthly wisdom vs. Heavenly wisdom** - One leads to disorder and vile practices; the other to peace and righteousness
3. **The Christian life involves an internal war** between the Spirit and the flesh
4. **Humility before God is the key** to accessing His grace and transformation

5. **Friendship with the world makes us enemies of God** - we must choose whom we will serve

Discussion Questions

Understanding the Text

1. **James 3:13** - James asks "Who is wise and understanding among you?" How does he say we can identify truly wise people? Why is this different from the world's definition of wisdom?
2. **James 3:14-16** - What are the characteristics of "earthly" wisdom? Can you think of examples in our culture today where jealousy and selfish ambition lead to "disorder and every vile practice"?
3. **James 3:17-18** - List the seven characteristics of wisdom from above. Which of these do you find most challenging to live out?

Going Deeper

4. The sermon connected James's teaching to Jesus's Beatitudes (Matthew 5). How does seeing this connection help you understand what James is teaching?
5. The sermon used the illustration of Tom Bombadil being immune to the ring's temptation. Why can't we achieve that kind of purity on our own? What does this teach us about our need for Christ?
6. **James 4:1-3** - The pastor discussed how the Lord's Prayer models proper petition before God. How does starting with "hallowed be your name" and "your will be done" change the way we pray for our needs?
7. **James 4:4** - "Friendship with the world is enmity with God." This is strong language. What does it mean to be a "friend of the world"? Where do you see pressure in your life to conform to worldly wisdom rather than godly wisdom?

Personal Application

8. The sermon emphasized that "humility is the key." In what areas of your life do you struggle most with pride? What would humility look like in those specific situations?
9. James says we should show our works "in the meekness of wisdom" (3:13). How can you serve others this week in a way that doesn't seek recognition or applause?

10. The Rocky illustration showed how transformation came when he met Adrian and learned self-control. How has the Holy Spirit been your "helper" in transforming areas of your life from wild and selfish to measured and humble?
11. **James 4:6** - "God opposes the proud but gives grace to the humble." What does it practically look like to humble yourself before God this week?

Practical Applications

Choose 1-2 of these to commit to this week:

Individual Practices

- **Meditation Exercise:** Spend 5 minutes each day meditating on who God is before making any requests in prayer. Journal about what you discover.
- **Wisdom Audit:** Evaluate your recent decisions. Were they motivated by earthly wisdom (jealousy, selfish ambition) or heavenly wisdom (purity, peace, gentleness)?
- **The Lord's Prayer:** Pray through the Lord's Prayer slowly each day, pausing at each phrase to align your will with God's.

Relational Practices

- **Humble Service:** Do something to serve someone this week without telling anyone else about it.
- **Peacemaking:** If there's conflict in your life, take the initiative to pursue peace this week in a gentle, humble way.
- **Forgiveness:** Following the Lord's Prayer model, identify someone you need to forgive and take a step toward reconciliation.

Community Practices

- **Accountability:** Share with one person in the group an area where you struggle with pride, and ask them to pray for you and check in with you.
 - **Wisdom Recognition:** Look for someone in your church who demonstrates the meekness of wisdom James describes, and encourage them this week.

Memory Verse

James 3:17 - "But the wisdom from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, open to reason, full of mercy and good fruits, impartial and sincere."

Closing Reflection

The sermon concluded: "You can be saved by works, just not yours. Only Christ's work on the cross and his resurrection can save you."

5-Day Devotional: Walking in Heavenly Wisdom



Day 1: The Fear of the Lord - Beginning of Wisdom

Reading: Proverbs 9:10; Job 42:1-6; James 3:13-18

Devotional: True wisdom begins when we recognize who God truly is. Like Job, who defended himself throughout his trials, we often forget our place before the Almighty. When God revealed Himself to Job, his only response was humility: "Who am I?" This is the starting point of wisdom—understanding that we weren't present when God laid the earth's foundations, that we cannot comprehend His majesty. Our knowledge, achievements, and righteousness pale before His holiness. This recognition isn't meant to crush us but to free us. When we grasp how desperately we need Christ's cross, pride evaporates. We stop striving to prove ourselves and start resting in His grace. Today, pause and meditate on God's holiness. Let that awareness transform your prayers, decisions, and interactions.

Day 2: Pure in Heart, Pure in Action

Reading: Matthew 5:1-12; James 3:17-18; 1 John 3:2-3

Devotional: James echoes Jesus' Beatitudes, reminding us that purity begins internally. The "wisdom from above" is first pure, then peaceable and gentle. Notice the order—purity comes first. We cannot manufacture external righteousness while harboring bitter jealousy or selfish ambition within. Like Rocky's transformation when he met Adrian, true change happens when we allow God's Spirit to contain and direct our passions. Our aggression, strength, and talents aren't inherently wrong; it's how we use them. The Holy Spirit works as our divine Helper, transforming wild, self-serving actions into measured, humble service. The pure in heart shall see God because only God can make us pure. Stop trying to clean up your exterior while ignoring your heart. Invite the Spirit to purify you from within, and watch how your conduct naturally reflects Christ.

Day 3: Praying in Alignment with God's Will

Reading: Matthew 6:5-15; James 4:1-3; 1 John 5:14-15

Devotional: "You ask but don't receive because you ask with wrong motives." How often do our prayers begin with our desires rather than God's glory? The Lord's Prayer provides a blueprint: start by acknowledging God's holiness, then align your will with His before making requests. We approach the throne of grace, not an ATM machine. When we meditate on who God is—His sovereignty, wisdom, and love—our petitions transform. What seemed urgent becomes less important; what we overlooked becomes priority. "Your kingdom come, Your will be done" isn't resignation but realignment. It's positioning our hearts to want what God wants. Before you pray today, spend time in awe of God. Ask Him to align your desires with His purposes. Then petition confidently, knowing your requests flow from a heart surrendered to His will.

Day 4: Friendship with God vs. Friendship with the World

Reading: James 4:4-6; Romans 12:1-2; 1 John 2:15-17

Devotional: The world's definition of success, morality, and purpose constantly pressures us to conform. Like the serpent's ancient lie—"You can be like God, determining good and evil"—society whispers that we should define truth for ourselves. But friendship with the world makes us enemies of God. This doesn't mean isolating from unbelievers or lacking compassion; it means refusing to adopt worldly values. Why would we expect harmony between a broken world living by the flesh and a church transformed by the Spirit?

Opposition is inevitable. The question is: whose side do you want? God opposes the proud who trust their own wisdom but gives grace to the humble who depend on Him. Don't seek to appease the world; seek truth and offer healing through love. Stand firm, knowing God is on your side when you're on His.

Day 5: Humility - The Key to Transformation

Reading: Philippians 2:1-11; James 3:13, 4:6; 1 Peter 5:5-7

Devotional: Humility unlocks everything. It's the posture that receives grace, wisdom, and transformation. James asks, "Who among you is wise?" The answer isn't the most educated or successful, but whoever demonstrates "good conduct in the meekness of wisdom." Christ Himself modeled this—though equal with God, He humbled Himself to death on a cross. We cannot achieve holiness through our efforts; we've already fallen short. But here's the beautiful truth: you can be saved by works—just not yours. Only Christ's finished work saves and transforms. When we humbly submit to Him, the Holy Spirit renews our minds and transforms us from the inside out. Our external expressions begin reflecting internal transformation. We bear God's image, stained by sin but cleansed by Christ's blood. Today, embrace humility. Stop striving and start submitting. Let God restore His image in you.
