

Small Group Guide: Ezekiel 21-23 Judgment, Consequences, and Standing Firm in Faith



Summary:

Discussion Questions:

4. Accountability: Partner with another group member to check in regularly about areas where you're tempted to stray from God's path.
5. Serve others: Look for opportunities to help those facing difficulties, remembering that both the righteous and unrighteous face challenges in this broken world.
6. Media fast: Consider taking a break from certain forms of media or entertainment that might be distracting you from your spiritual growth.
7. Prayer focus: Spend time in prayer asking God to reveal any "idols" in your life and for the strength to put Him first in all things.

5-day Bible reading plan and devotional guide:



Day 1: God's Sovereignty in Judgment and Mercy

Reading: Ezekiel 21:1-7, Romans 11:22-23

Devotional:

God's judgment can be a difficult concept to grapple with, especially when we see both the righteous and wicked affected. However, today's reading reminds us that God remains sovereign even in times of judgment. His ultimate goal is not destruction, but restoration. Day 2: The Danger of Spiritual Complacency

Reading: Ezekiel 22:23-31, Revelation 3:15-19

Devotional:

The people of Israel had become spiritually complacent, mixing pagan practices with their worship of God. This gradual drift led to a devastating judgment. Similarly, we can sometimes grow lukewarm in our faith, compromising our values bit by bit until we find ourselves far from God's ideal for us.

Today, examine your heart. Are there areas where you've allowed worldly influences to creep in and compromise your relationship with God? Remember, God desires our wholehearted devotion. He is jealous for our affection because He knows that only in Him can we find true fulfillment and purpose. Recommit yourself to pursuing God with passion and purity.

Day 3: God's Faithfulness Despite Our Unfaithfulness

Reading: Ezekiel 23:35-39, 2 Timothy 2:13

Devotional:

The imagery in Ezekiel 23 paints a stark picture of Israel's unfaithfulness to God. Yet even in the face of such betrayal, God remained faithful to His covenant promises. This serves as a powerful reminder of God's unchanging nature and His commitment to His people.
