Small Group Guide: The Big Picture - Jesus in the Old Testament

Kings and Chronicles



Summary:

In the books of Kings and Chronicles, we uncover a profound lesson about God's unwavering commitment to His promises. Despite the tumultuous history of Israel and Judah, with kingdoms divided and countless kings failing to follow God, we see a golden thread of hope running through it all. Discussion Questions:

- 1. The message contained a personal story about facing homelessness and uncertainty. Have you ever experienced a time when you couldn't see God's plan, but looking back you can see how He was working? Share with the group.
- 2. How does understanding the big picture of Israel's history help us see Jesus in the Old Testament?
- 3. What struck you about the story of Athaliah and Jehoshabah? How does this demonstrate God's sovereignty in preserving the Messianic line?
- 4. The northern kingdom of Israel had no good kings, while Judah occasionally had righteous rulers. How might this relate to leadership in our lives today?
- 5. How does the 400-year period of silence before Jesus' arrival parallel the Israelites' time in Egypt? What does this teach us about waiting on God?
- 6. In what ways does Jesus fulfill the role of Messiah that was anticipated throughout Israel's history?

Practical Applications:

- 1. This week, try to identify an area of uncertainty in your life. Spend time in prayer, asking God to help you trust His bigger plan even when you can't see it.
- 2. Choose one Old Testament book (perhaps 1 Kings or 1 Chronicles) and read it with the perspective of looking for hints of Jesus and God's redemptive plan.
- 3. Make a timeline of your life, noting significant events. Reflect on how God may have been working behind the scenes, even in difficult times.
- 4. Practice sharing your testimony, focusing on how God has worked in your life over time, similar to how the pastor shared his story.
- 5. Commit to praying for current leaders (in church, work, or government), that they would seek God's wisdom like the good kings of Judah.

Closing Thought:

Just as God preserved the line of David through centuries of turmoil to bring about the Messiah, He is working in our lives and in our world today. Let's encourage one another to trust in His bigger picture, even when we can't see it clearly.

5-day Bible reading plan and devotional guide:



Day 1: God's Faithfulness in Uncertain Times

Reading: 1 Kings 12:1-24

Devotional:

Just as Rehoboam faced a kingdom divided, we often encounter times of uncertainty and division in our lives. Yet even in these moments, God remains faithful. Reflect on a time when you felt lost or uncertain about your path. How did God guide you through that period? Remember that God's plans are often beyond our understanding, but He is always working for our good. Today, trust in His faithfulness, even when the path ahead seems unclear.

Day 2: The Danger of False Worship

Reading: 1 Kings 12:25-33

Devotional:

Jeroboam's creation of golden calves reminds us how easily we can be led astray by false idols. In our modern world, these idols might not be golden statues, but could be success, money, or even relationships that we prioritize over God. What are the "golden calves" in your life that might be drawing your heart away from true worship? Ask God to reveal any areas where you've allowed false worship to creep in, and recommit yourself to putting Him first in all things.

Day 3: God's Protection of His Promises

Reading: 2 Kings 11:1-3

Devotional:

The story of Joash's rescue demonstrates God's incredible commitment to His promises. Even when it seemed all hope was lost, God preserved the line of David through one small child. This reminds us that God's plans cannot be thwarted, no matter how dire circumstances may appear. What promises of God are you holding onto in your life? How can you trust Him more deeply, knowing that He will always fulfill His word, even in seemingly impossible situations?

Day 4: The Power of One Faithful Act

Reading: 2 Kings 11:4-21

Devotional:

Jehosheba's brave act of rescuing Joash had far-reaching consequences, preserving the Messianic line. This shows us that even small acts of faithfulness can have a tremendous impact in God's plan. Reflect on times when a small act of kindness or obedience led to unexpected blessings. How might God be calling you to step out in faith today, even in a seemingly small way? Remember, your faithfulness matters more than you know.

Day 5: Hope in the Midst of Silence

Reading: Malachi 4:5-6, Luke 1:5-25

Devotional:

The 400 years of silence between the Old and New Testaments mirror the 400 years of Israelite slavery in Egypt. Both periods ended with the arrival of a deliverer - Moses, and then Jesus. When God seems silent in your life, it doesn't mean He's absent. He's often preparing something greater than we can imagine. In what areas of your life do you need renewed hope? Take time to thank God for His ongoing work, even when you can't see it, and ask Him to strengthen your faith as you wait for His perfect timing.
