

REFLECT

- 1. What relationships do you have with people outside your stage of life?
- 2. How is this relationship different or more difficult than other relationships? How is this relationship important for helping you grow?

ENCOUNTER

This week's sermon was on the institution of marriage in Genesis 2. Perhaps that leaves groups of people--single, divorced, widowed, children--wondering, "How does this apply to me?" We ought never to think that life stages exempt us from learning about what God's Word says to others. Why? Because to be made in the image of God is to be made for community. To be a part of a church is to be a vital member of the body. So everyone needs to learn about God's design for marriage. Married people need to learn about singleness. Single people need to learn about parenting. Men need to learn about women. Young people need to consider their elders; and elderly need to remember what young people face.

Titus 2 paints the picture of a community shaped by healthy teaching in a whole range of life stages and relationships. Read and discuss Titus 2 together.

- 4. What admonition does Paul give to each life stage?

5. Different life stages may be prone to different temptations. Look again at the admonition to each stage. Do the admonitions indicate a particular temptation for each stage?
