ENCOUNTER

Koinonia. The Greek word is translated as "fellowship," "communion," "partnership, "common life." A Bible dictionary defines *koinonia* as "fellowship, association, community, communion, joint participation, intercourse; in the N. T. as in classical Greek....the share which one has in anything, participation" (Thayer's Lexicon). It's a key word in the New Testament because the Christian life was never meant to be lived alone. We were made to grow together in biblical community.
