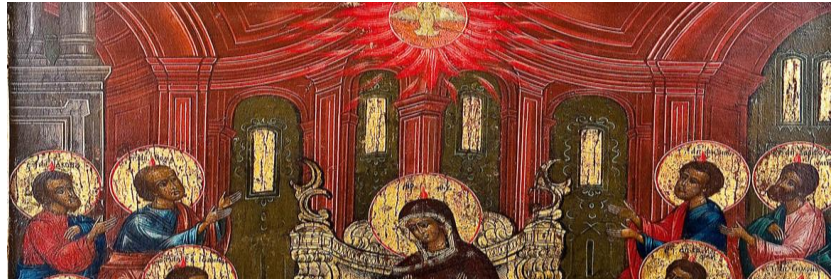

DAY OF PENTECOST



The Day of Pentecost marks fifty days since Easter Day and brings the Easter season to an end. It is a major feast of the Church's year when Christians recall how God's Holy Spirit was given to the disciples after Jesus' ascension, empowering them to begin the work of making disciples of all nations.

Pentecost (which comes from the Greek word for 'fiftieth') has its roots in the Jewish Feast of Weeks. The color most often associated with Pentecost is red, representing the tongues of fire which the Acts of the Apostles describes appearing above the heads of the disciples as a sign that they had received the Holy Spirit.

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Acts 2, Chapter 2

FIRST QUARTER STEWARDSHIP LETTER: GIVING JOYFULLY



"I do not say this as a command...For you know the generous act of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich." 2 Corinthians 8:8-9

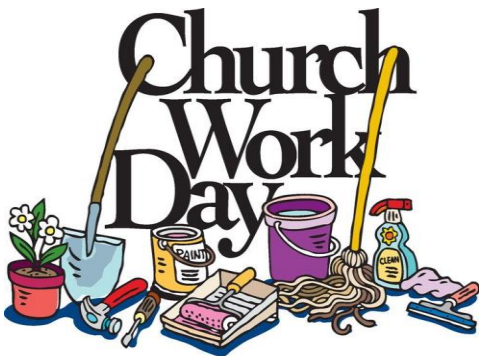
At the beginning of our 2023 Stewardship campaign, I encouraged St. Peter's Church to see financial giving to the Church as an act of Eucharistic thanksgiving, rather than an act of commanded obligation. God has given us everything in Jesus Christ, so we respond in all areas of our life with joyful self-giving, including with our finances. Joyful giving is the theme that controls financial generosity in the New Testament, particularly in the writings of St. Paul. The clearest example of joyful giving as the standard for financial generosity is found in 2 Corinthians chapter 8, where Paul encourages generosity from the Corinthian Church not as a command, but as yet another opportunity to respond to the self-giving love of God. I, along with the Vestry and Wardens of St. Peter's, felt that this is an appropriate time to be reminded of the New Testament's teachings regarding financial generosity at the end of the first quarter of our fiscal year.

St. Peter's has grown remarkably quickly in terms of average Sunday attendance, and as we look to the future, St. Peter's will need to add staff, and address our building situation in order to grow responsibly and ensure that St. Peter's is caring for its older and newer members well, without burning volunteers and clergy out. What a gift it would be to see St. Peter's hire a gifted Associate Rector to care for youth and families, who could also focus on the growing pastoral care needs in our Parish, to name one example.

The question for each of us remains whether St. Peter's is a place where we encounter grace and goodness, and whether we would like to see the ministry of St. Peter's Church grow as God sees fit. If the answer to that question for any of us is, "yes," then we need to prayerfully discern increasing our financial giving. However, we answer that question, one thing must be certain, that we are giving joyfully in response to the gracious self-emptying love of Jesus Christ, who for our sake became poor, that by his poverty we might become rich.

SAINT RITA of CASCIA FEAST DAY MAY 22ND



Saint Rita promised her parents that she would marry, and in so doing she made an unhappy choice. Her husband was an alcoholic, violent towards her and unfaithful. When her husband died from his own violent life style, her two sons avowed that they would seek revenge. Saint Rita prayed that her two sons would die before they committed a murder, and her prayer was answered when they both became ill with a fatal disease. Nursing them to good health, and at the same time changing their hearts to that of a Christian, they forgave their father's killer.

After continually petitioning for entry to the convent of Augustinian nuns at Cascia she was finally granted entry in 1413. Thirty years after joining the convent, Saint Rita experienced a sense of mystical union with Christ during a sermon about the crown of thorns. During prayer she experienced a pain in her head that was as if a thorn had been embedded there. A wound with a discharge developed in her head that became extremely offensive to the other nuns and she was placed in seclusion. Sixteen years later she died of tuberculosis.

Saint Rita of Cascia was known for her holiness in providing comfort to others. She is the patron for desperate people, desperate causes, and unhappy wives. Her feast day is celebrated on May 22nd.

PARISH BY-LAWS AMENDED – The by-law change presented to the parish was adopted by the Parish Vestry at their April meeting.

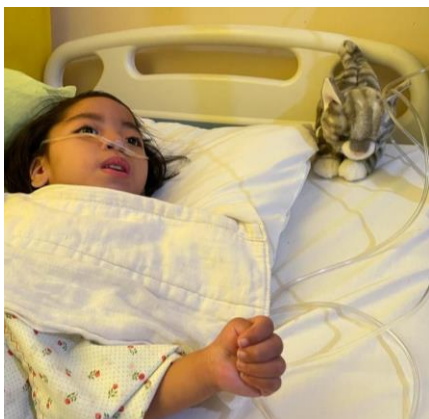

ZETEO ILLNESS ENDS – NEW ISSUE ARISES



The “illness” that has gone through Zeteo is basically over. Hannah was discharged from the hospital (photo of Hannah with cat which was sent by St. Peter’s), so all the children are now home. Two children still have follow-up visits to the physician but are stable. Kate is trying to find a pulmonologist in Manila to help with Hannah’s acute and probably long-term care.

The illness or virus caused temperatures of 103 to 104 degrees and resulted in pneumonia in many children and adults and 3 children had to be hospitalized. Much of the nation was struck by this illness and many at the Just Projects Conference where Kate was to speak became ill. Many of the Just Projects staff are still ill and may not be able to assist Zeteo with their NACC/DSWD visit as much as was hoped (see below). As you can imagine, the unexpected costs associated with doctor visits and hospital stays has been a drain on Zeteo’s finances. Zeteo has also run out of Tylenol, cough syrup and cold medicine.

In the Philippines the National Authority of Childcare (NACC) was established in 2022 as part of the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD). They are reviewing all of the country’s foster care, orphanages, etc. with the goal of placing all children in adoptive homes quickly. This seems wonderful: however, the children at Zeteo have all been through extreme trauma and many have severe disabilities requiring needs beyond an average child. It would take an exceptional parent/home to meet these needs and we are praying that will not be overlooked.

Kate is a certified instructor in Trust Based Relational Intervention (TBRI) which is an approach for caregivers of children who have faced abuse, neglect and/or trauma. It is important that children do not go from the Zeteo environment of trust and safety to a home that is unable to provide the same atmosphere that she can provide: the trust-based care and love Zeteo children need. The visit by DWSWD was the last Thursday of April, and they left being impressed with the knowledge that no else is doing what they do. We ask for prayers that the government will see Zeteo as an asset to displaced children who have experienced trauma. Also, that they will not feel compelled to place the children in homes that are not equipped to care for their special needs. At the end of April Kate was informed by Just Projects that they would be funding a full-time social worker for Zeteo in the future.

A final note, Kate texted me along with the picture of Hannah, “And I am glad the photo from the hospital communicated the reality of the impact felt here as well. **You (St. Peter’s) are part of our daily lives here,**” Thank you for your continued support of Zeteo, and if you have any questions, please contact me.

SENIOR WARDEN'S NOTE CONCERNING CHURCH GROWTH AND CHANGE



Greetings Brother and Sisters at St. Peter's. I come bringing good news of **dramatic growth** since 2018-2019 with the parish membership more than doubling in size! An increase in our church body offers both opportunity and growing pains. Given our growth, as members of the leadership team, we want to do our part to act deliberately and transparently for the good of the church. We also want to share with you some of what the vestry and leadership team are thinking.

To that end, we asked Bishop Trevor Walters to speak with us about managing growth and transition. He, as usual, had good suggestions. For background, churches up to a membership of 75 are typically centered around families and everyone knows each other well. Churches from 75 to 140 members are considered priest centered and the priest needs to start delegating responsibility to others in order not to have to work seventy to eighty hours per week. It is normal for some parishioners to be feeling like they do not get enough of the priest's attention as much as before, and that is true, though nothing personal. Churches at 140+ in membership continue this transition to delegate and diversify as ministry needs increase.

As we grow, there are exciting opportunities to expand in areas such as youth ministry. Once our giving can support it, for example, we could even have someone in full-time youth and family ministry, offering needed additional care and leadership. We invite everyone in the parish to be an active part of the community and to be aware of these needs and the growing pains we are facing as well as the joys and opportunities for service.

We on the leadership team and vestry will do our best as we are all cognizant of and committed to good culture at St. Peter's, and in living out our faith in community with love for God and neighbor. We are also committed to moving forward with humility and in a church environment where members can flourish, feel safe and experience life in Christ.

IRA CONTRIBUTIONS TO ST. PETER'S FOR THOSE AGE 70½ OR OLDER



For those in the parish who are age 70½ or older, taking required minimum distributions (RMSs) each year from your IRA, and donating to qualified charitable distributions (QCDs), may make good financial sense for you. A QCD is a direct transfer of funds from your IRA custodian, payable to a qualified charity (St. Peter's Anglican Church). Amounts distributed as a QCD can be counted toward satisfying your RMD for the year, up to \$100,000, and can be excluded from taxable income. This is opposed to regular RMDs that are counted as taxable income even if you later can offset that income with itemized charitable deductions. Also, with the recent tax laws, many no longer itemize deductions because of the higher standard/additional deductions for those age 65 and older. This makes QCDs even more valuable for reducing taxes. As with any tax consideration, be sure to seek the advice of your financial/tax professional.

For the QCD to count toward your current year's RMD, the funds must come out of your IRA by your RMD deadline, which is generally December 31st each year. Funds must be transferred directly from your IRA custodian to the qualified charity (St. Peter's Anglican Church). This is accomplished by requesting your IRA custodian issue a check from your IRA account **payable to the charity**. You can request that the check be mailed to the charity or you can forward the check to the charity yourself. (**NOTE:** if the check is made payable to you, the distribution would not qualify as a QCD and would be treated as taxable income.)

STEP #1 – Contact your IRA Custodian and ask what paperwork is required to make a QCD.

STEP #2 – Complete the paperwork and have the check made out to *St. Peter's Anglican Church*.

STEP #3 – The check can be mailed directly to St. Peter's Anglican Church 4044 Duffield Avenue, Loveland, Colorado 80538 or picked up and delivered to Church Treasurer Mike Cooper.

STEP #4 - Be sure to enclose a note that indicates your name so the Treasurer can give you proper credit.

QCDs are a rare gift from Uncle Sam! Please consider taking advantage of them to give to your favorite charity (St. Peter's Anglican Church).

GAFCON 2023 IN KIGALI, RWANDA



Chaired by ACNA Archbishop, the Most Reverend Doctor Foley Beach, Global Anglican Future Conference IV recently concluded in Kigali, Rwanda. Among the 3,000 plus participants from around the globe were International Diocese Bishop Bill Atwood and retired Bishop Trevor Walters. The statement below presents the future for GAFCON. OUR FUTURE TOGETHER

As we considered the future of our movement, we welcomed the following seven priorities articulated by the General Secretary and endorsed by the Gafcon Primates.

We will engage in a **decade of discipleship, evangelism, and mission (2023-2033)**.

We will devote ourselves to raising up the **next generation of leaders** in Gafcon through Bible-based theological education that will equip them to be Christ-centered and servant-hearted.

We will prioritize **youth and children's ministry** that instructs them in the Word of the Lord, disciples them to maturity in Christ and equips them for a lifetime of Christian service.

We will affirm and encourage the vital and diverse ministries, including leadership roles, of **Gafcon women** in family, church, and society, both as individuals and as groups.

We will demonstrate the compassion of Christ through the many **Gafcon mercy ministries**.

We will resource and support **bishops' training** that produces faithful, courageous, servant leaders.

We will build the bonds of fellowship and mutual edification through **interprovincial visits of our Primates**.

Arising from our conference we encouraged the Primates Council also to prioritize discipleship for boys and men. In order to pursue these priorities and to grow the work of the Gafcon movement, we endorsed the establishment of a foundation endowment. We also encouraged the Gafcon provinces to become financially self-sufficient, not only to advance mission but also to avoid being vulnerable to economic manipulation. Most importantly of all, we commit ourselves afresh to the gospel mission of proclaiming the crucified, risen and ascended Christ, calling on all to acknowledge him as Lord in repentance and faith, and living out a joyful, faithful obedience to his Word in all areas of our lives. We will explore fresh ways to encourage each other, to pray for one another and to hold each other accountable in these things.

We commit ourselves into the hands of our almighty and loving heavenly Father with confidence that he will fulfil all his promises and, even through a time of pruning, Christ will build his church.

ROBERT'S VILLAGE DONATION CHANGE

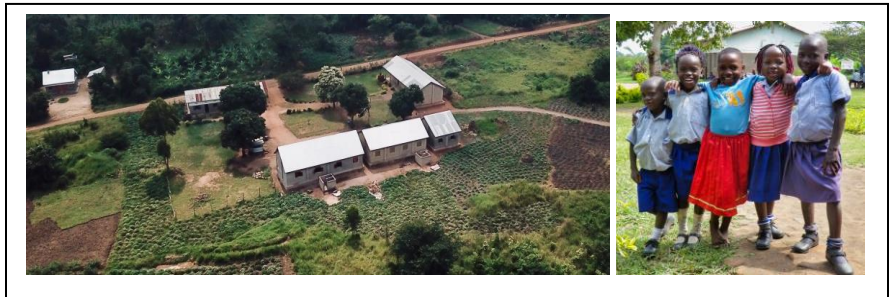

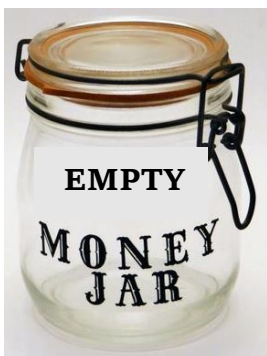

ZETEO MISSIONS AND KATE BERG DONATION PROCESS CHANGE



For those of you that are financial supporters of the Zeteo Ministry at St. Peter's Anglican Church, we wanted to inform you of a change in the way that Kate and the Zeteo Mission will receive donations. St. Peter's will no longer be serving as a go-between to process donations for Zeteo, but is instead encouraging giving to Zeteo through a local organization that supports missionaries in the field around the world called "**Servants of Christ International**," based out of Milliken, Colorado. "Servants of Christ," or "SOCI," is a trustworthy organization with a long track record of supporting overseas missions, and is an IRS 501c3, meaning tax deductible donations can be given directly to Kate and the Zeteo Mission through the SOCI website, and no longer through St. Peter's.

Both Kate and the leadership of St. Peter's want to make it very clear that this adjustment in how funds are routed to Zeteo should in no way impact our relationship with Kate, the dear little children, or the staff at the mission. We will continue to support God's incredible healing work done through Kate and Zeteo, but without processing donations for the mission. **Our monthly boxes to Zeteo and our Outreach Committee support will continue as always.**

How can donations be made to Zeteo through SOCI? First, go to the SOCI homepage (servantsintl.org), and click the large blue tab on the top right-hand corner of the page labeled "donate now," which will take you to a donations page that will allow you to choose the amount, frequency, and recipient of your financial gift. Click the dropdown box labeled "designations," and you will find a number of missionaries and agencies to choose from. Scroll to "Berg, Kate-Zeteo Mission," and click the red "donate" button at the bottom of the page. Alternatively, you can go to Kate's homepage on the SOCI website, (servantsintl.org/missionaries/berg-kate-philippines/), and click the "donate now" button in the middle of the page to reach the donation page for Kate.
