REFLECTION

Take a deep breath. Open your heart and mind so that you might *surrender* to the Lord and *receive* from the Lord.

Begin by *identifying* the threats to your joy.

Are there circumstances that you are facing that might rob you of joy? What worldly temptations or idols threaten joy in your life?

Confess those things to the Lord. Acknowledge your need of rescue and refuge in Christ alone.


Contemplate how Philippians 1:6 might reshape your fight for joy.

Remember (Week One)...

The Bible was written *for us*, but it is not *about* us.

The Bible isn't a book! (Even though the term 'Bible' comes from the Greek word, Biblos - meaning book.)

The Bible is a very large anthology - a collection of sacred writings, inspired by the Holy Spirit, penned by multiple human authors, using different literature styles, across multiple cultures, over 1,400+ years!

And yet, the Bible tells ONE STORY.

One Story with many Stories



The Law, Covenant, Gospels, Church + more!

Within the grand story, many 'chapters', or stories provide a vision and design for human flourishing by the means of grace.

How this helps you read the Bible...

1) It keeps our focus on Jesus.

Every story has a main character. The Bible's main character is God - specifically, as He reveals Himself to us in the Person of Jesus Christ.

If we learn individual Bible stories and never connect them to the one big Story, we put ourselves in the story as if we are the main character. The Bible then becomes a collection of moral lessons to help us along in the life we've chosen for ourselves, instead of people who need rescue, who need a Savior who will deliver us from Satan, sin, and death.

2) It provides us with a better worldview.

We live in a world of competing narratives. What is ultimate reality? We believe the Gospel Story to be the most compelling of all the stories. It gives us a vision for what is *true*, *good*, and *beautiful*. As followers of Jesus, we have a story to ell the world.
