

The Cost of Compromise June 11, 2023

Revelation 2:18-29

Questions for Study and Group Discussion

- ** Before you begin, please read Revelation 2:18-29
- 1. Icebreaker: Look up the definitions of compromise. When is compromise good? When can compromise be bad?
- 2. How was the church in Thyatira being pulled toward spiritual compromise? (See Revelation 2:20.) Why is this so dangerous?
- 3. Here's how the nature of spiritual compromise was explained in the message: Spiritual compromise can start to happen when you ignore or grow indifferent toward that which is essential to the Christian faith. Now reflect on any or all of these sub-questions, based on this definition:
 - What stands out to you about this definition?
 - Is there anything you'd add?
 - What other questions does this definition bring up that you want to discuss?
- 4. What is the cost (or consequence) of compromise that you see in Revelation 2:21-23?
- 5. Imagine you were asked by a friend to explain how the truth of Jesus's love lines up with what we read here about Jesus's discipline and judgment. What would you say?
- 6. In Revelation 2:21, we see that repentance is one "cure" for spiritual compromise. What does it mean to repent? And how is this summons to repentance a display of God's grace? (See also 1 John 1:9.)
- 7. Revelation 2:25 brings up a preventative cure for spiritual compromise: "holding on" or "holding fast" to what you have. What is it that Jesus is calling the church to hold onto here? (Hint: See Hebrews 12:1-3.)
- 8. What does it look like, practically speaking, to "hold fast" to Jesus Christ and the truths of the gospel? What steps can you take to increase your "grip strength"?
- 9. What other questions or comments do you have about this passage that haven't yet come up and that you'd like to discuss?
- 10. What is your biggest take-away from what you've discussed so far? What practical step will you take to apply what you've seen in God's Word?
- 11. **Challenge:** Identify one way this passage is challenging or encouraging you. Who can you tell about what you're learning this coming week?
