

Called To Serve Part 1: The Foundation of Ministry

The Foundation of Ministry

Ministry isn't just about what we do for others. It's a transformative process that shapes us into the image of Christ. As we serve, God works on our character, addressing areas that need growth and refinement.

This dual purpose is beautifully illustrated in the construction of a skyscraper. As the building rises higher, its foundation must sink deeper. Similarly, as God elevates us in service, He calls us to root ourselves more profoundly in Him.

The Heart of Ministry

While there are many forms of ministry – from teaching and evangelism to serving in practical ways – the heart behind our service matters most. Colossians 3:23-24 (Amplified) captures this beautifully:

"Whatever you do, whatever your task may be, work from the soul [that is, put in your very best effort], as something done for the Lord and not for men, knowing [with all certainty] that it is from the Lord [not from men] that you will receive the inheritance which is your [greatest] reward. It is the Lord Christ whom you [actually] serve."

Imagine if Jesus was visibly present as your ministry leader. How would that change your approach? This perspective transforms even the most mundane tasks into acts of worship and devotion.

Growing in Character

As we serve, God doesn't just use us – He shapes us. 2 Peter 1:5-8 outlines a progression of character growth:

"But also for this very reason, giving all diligence, add to your faith virtue, to virtue knowledge, to knowledge self-control, to self-control perseverance, to perseverance godliness, to godliness brotherly kindness, and to brotherly kindness love. For if these things are yours and abound, you will be neither barren nor unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ."

This isn't a checklist to complete, but a lifelong journey of allowing the Holy Spirit to develop Christ-like qualities within us. As we grow in these areas, our ministry becomes more effective and our influence more lasting.

Finding Your Place

So, how do we apply these truths? Here are some questions to ponder:

1. Is there an area of service God is speaking to you about? This could be within an established ministry or something entirely new He's placing on your heart.
2. What aspects of your character might Jesus be addressing? Are there attitudes or behaviors that need to change?
3. How can you grow deeper in your relationship with Christ? Remember, this is the foundation for all effective ministry.

The beauty of God's Kingdom is that there's a place for everyone. Your gifts, your experiences, even your struggles can be used to build up others and glorify God. It might be as visible as preaching or as behind-the-scenes as straightening chairs – both are valuable in God's eyes when done with a heart of service.

A Call to Action

Building the Kingdom of God is the most significant project in all of history. It's not about constructing physical monuments, but about transformed lives and eternal impact. Jesus, the master builder, invites each of us to play a part.

If you've never surrendered your life to Christ, that's the essential first step. Without a relationship with Him, our efforts at "good works" fall short. But for those who have experienced His forgiveness and new life, the call is clear: find your place in this grand design.

As you reflect on your role in God's Kingdom, remember that it's not about perfection, but willingness. God can use anyone who says "yes" to Him.
