:: Explore and Discuss | Ephesians 5:15-16, Romans 1:16-17 and Notes

The command (it's not an option) in Ephesians 5:15-16 could be expanded in meaning to say "Look/watch diligently/ precisely/accurately how you walk around/live, not as foolish/unwise but as wise. Making the best use of/redeeming." What are some of the specific implications of this verse for believers?

Read Eccl. 2:26, Col 1:9, and James 1:5. The wisdom of this world is foolishness in God's sight (1Cor. 3:19) but God grants His wisdom to those who believe. What makes worldly wisdom regarding how to live, what you need, what you should value, how to be happy, etc. so attractive?

Read Romans 1:16-17. From your reading of Scripture and growth as a disciple, how would you describe "salvation" from a biblical point of view?

What does it mean to live a "Gospel-centered life"?

:: Apply it to Your Life

Are there any aspects or situations in your life where you rely on your own (or the world's) wisdom instead of God's?

Instead of having the mind of Christ (1Cor. 2:16, 2Cor. 4:4), too many Christians are living with a shelter in place mindset – "I am saved, one day I will be in heaven with Jesus, now I just hunker down and quietly wait." How do you try to keep away from a shelter in place mindset?

Ask the Holy Spirit to illuminate your mind and grow you in your Christian worldview and commitment to make the most of the time because the days are evil.
