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The Sermon on the Mount: Matthew 5-7: An Overview An Introduction


Q. What was Jesus' purpose for this teaching, and how can it be applied?

As we will study Matthew 5-7 material together, the following information will hopefully help. What follows is not an exhaustive review but some aids for understanding the context of Matthew 5-7. Although it has been called the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus was teaching rather than preaching, Matt 5:2; 7:28-29. The Gospel account by Matthew in chapters 5-7 recorded Jesus's teaching regarding life as part of the Kingdom of Heaven. It was Jesus' presentation in a way they would not have heard the Torah (the first five books of the Hebrew Bible) taught before. The Torah was originally given on Mount Sinai, Ex 19-20. In contrast, Jesus presented His address on a Mountain in Galilee, Matt 5:1. The teaching here is practical and down to earth while at the same time very confronting. Matthew's format is unique; only Luke briefly mentions anything like it, Lk 6:20-49.

1. The Sermon on the Mount: Matthew 5-7: An Introduction

Q. How can we understand the teaching presented by Jesus in these chapters?

The book of Matthew is the first Gospel listed within the New Testament under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Although the Gospels of Mark and Luke may have been written first, Matthew comes straight after the close of the Hebrew Bible. It links the Hebrew Bible to the New Testament, focusing on what has been said and done in the Hebrew Bible.¹



The author of Matthew used the Hebrew Bible a lot in writing their linking account. They quoted the Hebrew Bible directly or indirectly over one hundred times compared with Mark about forty times, Luke around seventy, and John approximately fifty. It has been said that,

"The main purpose of Matthew in writing this account was to show Jesus as the King of the promised Kingdom. He sought 'to connect' the memories of His readers with their hopes, to show that the Lord of the Christian was the Messiah of the Jews,' the King of the promised Kingdom." ²

The following are three key passages that outline the idea of Jesus Christ as the coming King. It is an interwoven theme throughout this Gospel.

"The book of the genealogy of Jesus Christ, the son of David, the son of Abraham" (Matt 1:1 NASB).

"Where is He who has been born King of the Jews? For we saw His star in the east and have come to worship Him" (Matt 2:2 NASB).

"And Jesus came up and spoke to them, saying, 'All authority has been given to Me in heaven and on earth" (Matt 28:18 NASB).

These passages will help us understand the context of what Jesus the King said in Matt 5-7.

2. The Context of Matthew 5-7

Q. How do we understand the literary context of Jesus' teaching here?

The section of Scripture has a larger context than just these three chapters. It is vital to grasp this if we want to understand it. So, here we will look at the context leading into and out of the three chapters. In preparing to arrange the teaching found in their Gospel, the author introduced it in the following way.

- The Holy Spirit came upon Jesus: Matt 3:16
- The Father proclaimed His pleasure for His Son: Matt 3:17

Notice the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit are all present simultaneously in one place in these verses. It is essential to realise this as some have incorrectly taught that God the Father appeared in various modes throughout biblical history over the centuries. That is, they teach firstly, He appeared in the mode of the Father, then in the mode of the Son and ceased to be the Father, and then in the mode as the Holy Spirit while the Son stopped existing.

- The author recorded Jesus as saying, "From that time Jesus began to preach and say, 'Repent, for the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand'" (Matt 4:17 NASB).
- Then Matt 4:23-24 recorded how Jesus began to show the present reality of the Kingdom of Heaven as He healed the sick and freed the demonised.
- Matthew then introduced the reader to the many people who were now following Jesus around from around Galilee, the ten cities, and beyond the Jordan River: Matt 4:25
- We then see in the introduction of chapter five that these many people were still with Him, so He went up onto a mountain: Matt 5:1
- He sat down (cf. Lk 4:20) and began to teach the disciples regarding some of the principles and lifestyle of the Kingdom of God, and the crowds heard Him as well: Matt 5:1-2

Then, in concluding the Sermon, the author closed these chapters the following way.

- There will be two types of people, those who will hear and put His teaching into practice and those who will hear but do not do anything about it: Matt 7:24-27
- When Jesus had finished His authoritative teaching, the crowds were amazed by what they had just heard: Matt 7:28-29
- Jesus came down off the Mount: Matt 8:1
- Many people were still there with Jesus following Him: Matt 8:1
- The author then went on to close off this section by recording that Jesus continues to heal, this time a person with leprosy: Matt 8:2-4

Here is a table as a visual aid to the previous material. A colour code is used to help see some parallels and connections. The colours will match if there is a parallel; otherwise, it will be left white.

The following is the introduction context: Chiastic.

3. Some Breakdowns of the Sermon

Q. How can we break this teaching down to understand its parts?

The following are some summaries of Matthew chapters 5-7. Hopefully, they will help us understand the parts of this teaching of Jesus. You will notice that there is not just one way this can be broken down. Nevertheless, we can learn from each of them.

4. The Structure of the Teaching of Chapters 5-7

Q. Is there any methodological structure as part of the teaching that can help understand it?

The following is a brief overview of the teaching structure of Matt 5-7. You will find that although Jesus used different methods to get His teaching across, He mainly used comparisons. These comparisons were between the earthly perspective and the Heavenly one. For example, He used phrases like "You have heard that it was said..." "But I say to you..." Or He introduced an action showing how it is not to be done and then said, "But when you..." or "And when you..."

Some concluding thoughts

So, coming back to the opening question,

Q. What was Jesus' purpose for this teaching, and how can it be applied?

We have seen that the so-called Sermon on the Mount (since, as we have seen, Jesus was teaching, Matt 5:2; 7:28-29) is an incredible insight into the Kingdom of Heaven. Hopefully, the material within these pages will guide your continuing reading and study. Remember that nothing laid out here is exhaustive, merely an overview of the chapters. Its primary aim is to help you understand the literary context. So, please remember that whatever section you are reading or studying has context.

Remember that other contextual issues are not mentioned here. For example, there are areas like the social, religious, historical, and Hebrew Bible contexts, to mention only some. So, you will need to review these to know what and why something has been said here. We need to remember what it all meant to the original audience in Jesus' day. An important reason for this is that it cannot mean something different today from what it meant to the original audience. Only after we have determined this can we begin to review what it may mean for us today. Only then can we finally come to how we respond to what we have read and studied. The response will always come from the passage/s you are dealing with; we never have to read the response back into the passage/s.

I hope that your journey through this process will be rewarding. Sometimes, we can be so focused on the destination of our conclusion that we miss the joy of the journey of discovery. I hope that this will be a joyful journey of discovery for you. Can I encourage you not to merely repeat someone else's work or thoughts, e.g. a commentary, website, or book? Instead, read the passage/s and the surrounding context to find the gems for yourself. So, although some helpful insights have been given within these pages, use them as tools to begin and aid your digging. Once you find the gems, you will need to clean them up and polish them for your understanding and response. It is much more fulfilling when your Bible study is done this way. So, enjoy your journey of discovery and living out of the gems you have discovered.

So, from today onwards, we need to let the Holy Spirit guide our reading and studying these chapters to change our lives. We need to 'Stop and reflect.' We have seen what has been said on this matter. But what has the Holy Spirit been saying to you today? That is, what is the one thing that stands out to you? We all need to apply what we have learned; otherwise, it is merely all academic. Then, we need to respond to what the Holy Spirit has been saying to us.


In response, we need to ask through this process:

- What personal application can be found in the passages?

- That is, "What is God saying to me?"

How should I respond to what is being said, or so what?

- What are you going to do about it?
- What do you need to do to respond?
- Pray and respond
