   Matthew 23:9 (NIV)


# Insights

God the Father is revealed in Scripture as eternal, unchanging, and sovereign over all. Malachi 3:6 declares, "I the LORD do not change." This means God's nature and character remain constant through all time. His promises are sure because He is the same yesterday, today, and forever.

John 1:1–4 emphasizes God's eternal nature and role as Creator. Before time began, the Word (Christ) was with God and was God. Everything came into being through Him. This affirms that God the Father, together with the Son, is the source of all life.

In John 8:41–43, Jesus challenges the religious leaders about their claim that God was their Father. Genuine children of the Father love and obey the Son. This teaches that God's fatherhood is not simply a title—it is a relationship marked by love, obedience, and truth.

Matthew 23:9 reminds us that God is the ultimate Father. While we have earthly parents, our highest loyalty and identity come from Him. This truth grounds our faith and shapes how we live.

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Together, these passages show that God the Father is eternal, unchanging, and all-powerful, yet personal and relational. He invites us into His

family through Christ and calls us to trust His perfect wisdom, power, and love.

## **Application**

Knowing God as Father changes how we live. His eternal nature gives us confidence—when everything else changes, He remains the same. His wisdom and power assure us that He is in control, even when life feels uncertain.

As Father, God desires a relationship with us. We show we belong to Him by loving His Son and following His Word. This is more than words—it is daily trust and obedience.

Finally, recognizing God as our true Father frees us from seeking ultimate identity in people, possessions, or achievements. Our worth comes from belonging to Him. This truth leads us to worship, trust, and obey Him as our unchanging, all-powerful, loving Father.
